It's getting too easy to ruin someone's neighbourhood in

Take the situation in Lorne Park as an example In the rough triangle bordered by South Sheridan Way, Mississauga Road and Indian Road the zoning is R-2 under the Official Plan.

That allows for spacious houses on large lots, But along comes a pair of developers. Now any developer worthy of the name knows you can't make as big a buck throwing up houses on large lots as you can on smaller lots. More lots means more houses means more bucks.

It also means degradation of the neighbourhood by plan-

ting more concrete and unplanting more green space. So the developer presents the town with a plan to get the zoning changed so he can make more money. He asks town council to make life a little worse for residents so he can

make a lot more money.

And town council too often goes along. More houses means more people and more people means higher status for a politician — he's an official of a big town instead of a small

What good is the Official Plan? You can't trust it because your friendly neighbourhood politician may very well change it to accommodate a developer. And most of the changes

going on in Mississauga today are decidedly worse for the people those politicians represent.

That was so obvious in the Lorne Park case.
The neighbourhood is strictly R-2 on the Official Plan. There is no benefit to anyone but the developer in changing the zoning.

The people who live in the area and vote for the politicians said they don't want the Official Plan changed at all.

But the developers had gone through all the trouble and expense of plotting bigger profits for themselves at the residents' expense. Councillors can't let them go away completely empty-handed when they've made such a valiant

So even though there was no conceivable excuse for them to do so, your town councillors voted to degrade the neighbourhood in spots from R-2 to R-3.

One council member said that should be done because he'd "hate to see them go to the OMB and bring in townhouses in that area.

The OMB doesn't punish towns for turning down senseless spot-zoning requests by forcing even worse developments on

Councillors will turn down the ridiculous request for rezoning to allow a "mall-type" strip plaza, but don't be amazed if they compromise by letting the developer slip in a

"milk store." And don't bet that the gas station will be turned down by council, even though there is one abandoned in the area.

The residents have to defend themselves against ruinous changes and most likely compromise by accepting some of Why the hell should it be that way?

The system is screwed up and the politicians aren't helping

Mississauga councillors aren't really bad guys. In fact it's a better council than most towns can hope for. But they're caught up in the growth frenzy that could turn this area into a cramped, over-populated and vastly inferior.

Nobody wants that. But I'm afraid that things are going to

get a lot worse before — if ever — they get better. Bit by bit, Mississauga council is voting to ruin this place

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
