PART II. TRADE OF BRITISH WEST INDIAN COLONIES AND NEWFOUNDLAND

In Part II of this brochure the imports and exports for each unit of the British West Indian Colonies and Newfoundland are presented in rather complete detail for the latest year for which statistics are available, as also the total imports and exports for the past ten years, indicating in each case the amount of the imports and exports for (a) all countries, (b) Empire and foreign countries, and (c) principal countries. The statistics in this part of the brochure set forth the extent of the imports and exports of these various units of the Empire, as also the classes of commodities imported and exported.

It will be noted by reference to the following table showing the "Trade of the British West Indian Colonies and Newfoundland, year 1930 compared with 1921" that the trade of these British Countries with Other Empire Countries from 1921 to 1930 increased from \$119,410,725 to \$127,434,929,imports from Empire Countries increasing from \$69,000,153 to \$75,777,191, and exports to, from \$50,410,572 to \$51,657,738. During the same interval imports from Canada increased from \$26,849,889 to \$29,334,789, and exports to, from \$14,175,705 to \$18,882,957; imports from the United Kingdom increased from \$36,134,153 to \$37,130,528, while exports to decreased from \$32,744,800 to \$26,973,800; whereas imports from the United States decreased from \$49,784,659 to \$38,290, 465, while exports to the United States increased from \$18,570,248 to \$29,440,257. The imports from all countries, however, from 1921 to 1930 decreased from \$129,276,335 to \$127,824,373, while exports to increased from \$84,720,532 to \$101,791,385. Further, it will be observed that Canada furnished the British West Indian Colonies and Newfoundland with 20.8 per cent of their imports in 1921, and 22.9 per cent in 1930. The United Kingdom furnished these British countries with 27.9 per cent of their imports in 1921 and 29.0 per cent in 1930, while in 1921 the imports from the United States made up 38.5 per cent of their total imports, and 29.9 per cent in 1930.
