Sir,-

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the Elst ultimo, in the matter of the Onu-chu-Way-ha Indian Reserve; and in reply to inform you that it is not questioned that when an exchange is made by which the Provincial "Covernment sets apart a tract of land for Indian purpages and a portion of an Indian reserve is transferred to the Provincial Government in exchange therefor the Provincial Government has power to dispose of the former Indian reserve as it sees fit. It is obvious, however, that the question as to when such an suchange shall be made and the conditions upon which it chall be made are matters for the consideration of the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, and must be settled by congultation to the satisfaction of both parties to the exchange.

Applicationshaving been made at this Department for portions of the Indian reserve in question the Department of Indian Affairs cannot relieve itself of all responsibility in regard to the disposition of the land. No desire exists on the part of the Department of Indian Affairs except to serve the public interests in the most effective way, and in as much as the proposition made gives to Mr. Rogers an amount of
