town must be signed by a Government surveyor. Location of station must be approved by the Railway Commission.

42.—Why does the Government reserve property in British Columbia new towns? Ans.—In British Columbia the Government by legal enactment selects one-fourth of the property in each of the new towns, and what is not kept for buildings, Government parks, reserves, etc., is sold at public auction. Recently Government reserves at Prince Rupert were sold, and they brought over \$135,-000.00 more than the Government's estimate of their value.

43.—Is there any oil or gas in Western

Ans.—Yes. Many of the Grand Trunk Pacific new lines pass through extensive areas declared by the Dominion Government to be in the oil and gas belt. Gas has been discovered near many points on the Grand Trunk Pacific.
