## AUTONOMY DEBATE OFF

Till Fitzpatrick Returns to the  
House of Commons.

Mr. Borden Asks For a Chance to  
Reply to Minister of Justice's "Ex-  
planation" But Must Wait—Govern-  
ment in Desperate Straits to De-  
lay Debate Until After By-Elec-  
tions Are Over.

Ottawa, May 31.—The Government  
is not even going through the exercise  
of marking time. It is standing still,  
hand in a hat open manner. Mr. Bor-  
den asked the question when it was  
becoming historic as to when it was  
proposed to resume the discussion of  
the autonomy bill. Mr. Borden said  
that since Mr. Fitzpatrick's famous ex-  
planation regarding the difference be-  
tween the original and the amended  
clause 16 he had not had an opportu-  
nity of discussing it. He would like  
an early opportunity of doing so. Hon.  
Mr. Fielding, who was acting leader  
in the absence of Sir Wilfrid, replied  
that he could give no definite answer.  
He could say one thing, however, and  
that was the absence of the Minister  
of Justice had something to do with  
the delay in bringing the discus-  
sion on again.

The Government is being put to all  
sorts of stratagems to keep the debate  
in supply. Yesterday they put up Hon.  
Thomas Greenway, who chattered  
away about Mr. Borden's registration.  
When a Minister gets on his feet to  
explain a supplementary estimate item  
he gives an elaborate detailed argu-  
ment, with one eye on the clock, and  
hides it out as far as he can. Delay.  
Delay. Let London and North Oxford  
be off before the coercion of the west  
is again brought on. That is the un-  
flinching policy of the administration.  
The House got into supply at 11.40.  
Before the House adjourned, at  
11.45 a.m., Mr. Fielding announced  
that taking into consideration the  
wishes of both sides it had been de-  
cided to adjourn from to-night until  
Monday.

## FISHER CALLS IT UNFRIENDLY.

Agriculture Committee Discusses the  
British Cattle Embargo.

Ottawa, May 31.—Hon. Sydney Fisher,  
Minister of Agriculture, stated to the  
Agriculture Committee yesterday  
morning that Canada has been the  
victim of an "unfriendly act" on the  
part of Great Britain in connection with  
the cattle embargo. The day had been  
set apart to debate the question.  
Mr. Caldwell, Liberal member for  
North Lanark, said Canada should  
withdraw the preference until the em-  
bargo was removed.  
Mr. Fisher counselled more moderate  
action and advised that it was useless  
to expect the removal of the embargo  
at all, as the great majority of the  
British people seemed to favor it, and  
any action by the House of Commons  
to remove it would be thrown out by  
the Conservative House of Lords.

Mr. Fisher partially assented to this  
view, but thought we should have the  
alternative of shipping unfinished as  
well as finished cattle.  
The drift of the discussion was to-  
ward a modification of the regulation,  
such as giving more time before the  
cattle are necessarily slaughtered in  
England. A sub-committee was ap-  
pointed to draft a resolution embody-  
ing the committee's views.

## LONDON AND N. OXFORD.

Mass Meeting in Former City—Liberal  
Convention in Other.

London, May 31.—Three thousand  
people in the Jubilee Rink last night  
registered an emphatic protest against  
the coercion of the new provinces of  
the west. It was a "laboring man's  
meeting," thorough in earnest and  
wanting nothing in enthusiasm. If any  
doubt existed about the issue that will  
have to be met by the Government  
candidate it was dispelled, as no other  
question was discussed or even referred  
to. R. B. Bennett, of the Northwest  
Legislature, demonstrated that the  
new provinces do not consent to be  
shackled. Hon. George E. Foster made  
an effective address. Mr. Gray, the  
candidate, clearly defined his position,  
which is one of undying opposition to  
coercion. On Saturday night R. L. Bor-  
den will speak in the Princess rink.  
Sir William Mulock will be here on  
Thursday night.

Mr. Smith in North Oxford.  
Woodstock, May 31.—By a vote of  
151 to 117 George Smith of this city  
was yesterday afternoon selected as  
the nominee of the Liberal party in the  
coming bye-election in North Oxford.  
His opponent in the convention was E.  
W. Nesbitt of Woodstock. He moved  
that the nomination be made unani-  
mously. This the fight in North Oxford  
will be between Mr. Smith and J. C.  
Wallace, the Conservative nominee.

**Jurors Blame Josie Carr.**  
Toronto, May 31.—That Henry Mc-  
Harg Murray came to his death on the  
evening of May 15 or morning of the  
20th by criminal neglect and that Josie Carr,  
by her criminal neglect and ill-treat-  
ment of the child is responsible and  
that death was caused in a violent  
manner. This is the verdict of the  
jury in the Murray inquest, held last  
night. The enquiry was conducted by  
Chief Coroner Johnston. The Crown  
was represented by Mr. Drayton and  
the little girl prisoner Josie Carr, by  
Mr. Robinson.

**A School Teacher Drowned.**  
Colborne, May 31.—Alice M. Richards  
of Castleton, who has been teaching  
school in Chatham Township, was  
found drowned yesterday. She was  
about 30 years of age and at times has  
been the victim of despondency.
