LATE SIR DLIVER MOWAT.

M.A.P. Voices London the Great's Regret at His Falling Out.

Many in London felt a twinge of keen regret the other day when the news came that Sir Oliver Mowat, after a long and sturdy struggle with the grim enemy, had fallen out at last. The peculiar and searching eloquence of the little Ontario lawyer had often graced important gatherings and functions in London and yer had often graced important gatherings and functions in London, and there is a general and deep sorrow for his loss among those who were privileged to make his acquaintance on this side of the Atlantic. He had dropped in his harness at his eighty-thrid milestone, although this is no extraordinary feat for a Canadian. Dwellers in the great Prairieland seem to have a knack of sticking to hard work till they are eighty or so, and then retiring for a well-earned rest from their labors. Some hold on longer, as for example the gay and lively Lord Strathcona, now going on for eighty-four, who still atand lively Lord Strathcona, now going on for eighty-four, who still attends to the business of his various bank and railway directorates and the Canadian High Commissioner-ship, and may be expected to knock off for a holiday in five years' time

or thereabouts.
Sir Oliver Mowat's public career began long before the federation of the Canadian provinces, and he was thus familiar with the various courts of the succeeding Governors-General —Monck, Lisgar, Dufferin, Lorne, Lansdowne, Stanley of Preston, Aberdeen, and Minto. An interesting period it has been since 1867 in the history of Canada, and the Vice-Regal sojourners in the Dominion have enjoyed the life as well as the Canadians themselves. Things are more prim about Rideau Hall now perhaps than they were thirty years ago, when there was much freedom and fun at official headquarters. The Marchioness of Dufferin tells a story of 1873: "Two men dined with us; one, the Speaker of the Legislature in Manitoba, who has lately been of the succeeding Governors-General

one, the Speaker of the Legislature in Manitoba, who has lately been tarred and feathered by the people, and who came to relate his experiences of that operation."

The gifted Marchioness shared to the full her husband's popularity in Canada, and her homeliness won the hearts of everybody. A baby girl came to Rideau Hall in 1873, and as the Queen volunteered for godas the Queen volunteered for mother, the new "Canadian immigrant" became Lady Victoria Blackwood, with Sir John Macdonald as her godfather. Lady Dufferin had the whole of her six children at the christening ceremony, and Lord Basil Blackwood—not then four—got himself into a scrape by climbing over a pew at an important juncture in the proceedings and knocking down a pile of prayer-books. Lord Basil has been busy in South Africa for the last three years, and Lady Victoria, the Ottawa baby, has for the last eight years been the wife of the brilliant young Lord Plunket.—From M. A. P.

Curious Facts About Shad. In Canadian rivers the schools of shad come in from the sea about the middle of May, says Prof. Prince, the Canadian Commissioner of Cus-toms, and continue during June; but in the United States rivers they are often very much earlier. Dr. Per-ley speaks of them as appearing in January at Charleston, N.C., on the sount off New York they come in-shore in March and early April, and at Boston in the latter part of Ap-ril. An old Massachusetts fisher-man, in 1881, when he was nearly 90 years of age, stated that about April 1, the shad in millions ascended the Atlantic coast rivers, and continued during April and May. He added the statement—a very remark-able one, which exact scientific ob-servations have confirmed, that the first schools coming in, in early spring, were males, no females ever accompanying them. The females follow eight or ten days later, and the later schools are larger female fish with enlarged roes containing fish with enlarged roes containing eggs in a more advanced condition. In such a river as the St. John, New Brunswick, they ascend 50 or 60 miles up the main channel and turn up the tributaries on both sides. They frequently wander over the fields submerged during the spring freshets and deposit immense quanfreshets, and deposit immense quar riries of spawn of which much is inevitably lost when the water re-cedes. The choice of spawning grounds appears to be most erratic, as tributaries, which present every as tributaries, which present every apparent favorable feature are passed by, and others uniformly chosen which possess no superior advantage, so far as can be judged. Some shad fishermen assert the same erratic choice in the selection of the spawning sites in the rivers frequented by the shad. Thus one fisherman quested in The American Angler, Justice 1988. ed by the shad. Thus one fisherman quoted in The American Angler, July 1897, declared that on the eastern side of the Delaware River, at Marcus Hook and Tinicum, he always caught fine, large shad, that were full of solid roe, while directly opposite on the western side, the shad were not in such fine condition, and seemed to be in a spawning state that is, the spawn of the female and the rollt of the male ouzed constantly from the fish.

A Successful Trapper.

was in New York recently, says
Hyde's Art News, and told a friend
an interesting story of how two fishsermen of Labrador came into the
possession of the "Portrait of the
Countess of Essex," by Sir Joshua
Reynolds, and the "Portrait of a
Lady," by Gainsborough. As there
is not a particularly strong demand
along the coast of Labrador for
Gainsborough and Reynolds, the fishermen denied themselves the pleasure
of hanging these artistic treasures in
their local galleries, but eventually
turned them over to Mr. Johnson.
A few years ago the Dominion
steamship Scotsman was wrecked of
the Labrador coast in the Straits of
Belle Isle. In course of time a pack-Belle Isle. In course of time a packing case was washed up on the Labrador shore, and two fishermen picked it up. They tore off the outer boards and came upon a tin casing. "This is nothing less than corned beef," said one of the fishermen, exultingly.

beef," said one of the fishermen, exultingly.

"Or perhaps bacon," remarked the other, smacking his jaws.

To their great disappointment they found two oil paintings. Sadly they trudged to their huts and placed the pictures alongside the woodbox near the fireplace. Hopes of corned beef and bacon were dashed. Oil paintings, even by great masters, do not count for much up Labrador way. Months later these pictures passed into the possession of Mr. Johnson, and they turned out to be Sir and they turned out to be Sir Joshua Reynelds' "Countess of Es-sex" and Gainsborough's "Portrait of a Lady." Mr. Johnson corres-ponded with the shippers in England, and the pictures were returned to their rightful owner, the then Gov-ernor-General of Canada. The salv-age was, of course, paid, and the fishermen received their reward, which will keep them in corned beef and bacon for the rest of their natural lives

Trausmission of Electric Power.

Transmission of Elegisic Fower.
Recently the famous electrician,
Nikola Tesla, was asked his opinion
by The Toronto News as to the
transmission of electric power from
Niagara Falls to Toronto. Tesla re-

Niagara Falls to Toronto. Tesla replied as follows:

"The problems of transmission and storage of electrical energy have occupied my attention for many years. I have given a solution of the former in my multi-phase system, which is now accepted all the world over. Through the efforts of a great many able experts of the Westinghouse and General Electric Companies the machinery forming part of this system has been brought to a perfection General Electric Companies the machinery forming part of this system has been brought to a perfection such as to leave little room for improvement. But the aerial lines are still objectionable, and there are decided limits as to the electrical pressures which can be safely employed with them, and consequently as to the distance, at which power can be profitably transmitted. My energies have been largely directed towards overcoming these defects, and I believe that in my new underground system, in which the mains are insulated artificially by the circulation of gas at a very low temperature, they are completely done away with. By this method electrical energy can be transmitted to the greatest distance practically without any loss, and as to cost the new system compares very favorably with aerial lines.

'In regard to the storage of elec tricity I am not yet prepared to make my own results public. Speak-ing generally, the activity in this field is bordering on high fever heat and great advances cannot but fail to come soon. In view of all this, I know of no safer and at the same time, more promising undertaking than the exploitation of large water

Hon, Edward Blake, K.C., M.P. The London Daily Chronicle:—The Hon. Edward Blake, K.C., M.P., who is to be the counsel for his native Canada before the Alaskan boundary commission, has sat for Longford in the Imperial Parliament Longiord in the Imperial Parliament during the past ten years, but he has never become acclimitized at Westminster. At a dinner in Toronto in February, 1894, he described himself as "an Irishman and an Imperialist, not in the jingo sense of the Word, but an Imperialist in the fullest sense, believing that the destiny of the British Empire is to occupy the foremost position as a civilizer and foremost position as a civilizer and Christianizer throughout the whole
