SHARP'S Self-Dumping Horse Rake.



The WHEELS are of the STRONGEST POSSIBLE MAKE consistent with moderate weight. They have WHITE OAK and HICKORY SPOKES, bent rims and IRON HUBS. Experience has demonstrated the fact that spokes which are properly prepared and driven into an iron hub by force of a steam spring-hammer, as they are in "SHARP'S" RAKE, *never get loose*. The TEETH CLEARING IN SHARP'S RAKE is effected by a simple cleaner rake, the teeth of which enter between the rake teeth from the back as they rise when dumped, discharging the hay in the most effectual manner. There are no cleaner rods or staples for the hay to tangle round and prevent the proper filling of the rake, but the teeth, while raking, being free from every obstruction will gather more hay with less labor, and discharge easier, than any rake with the old clumsy cleaner rod device. 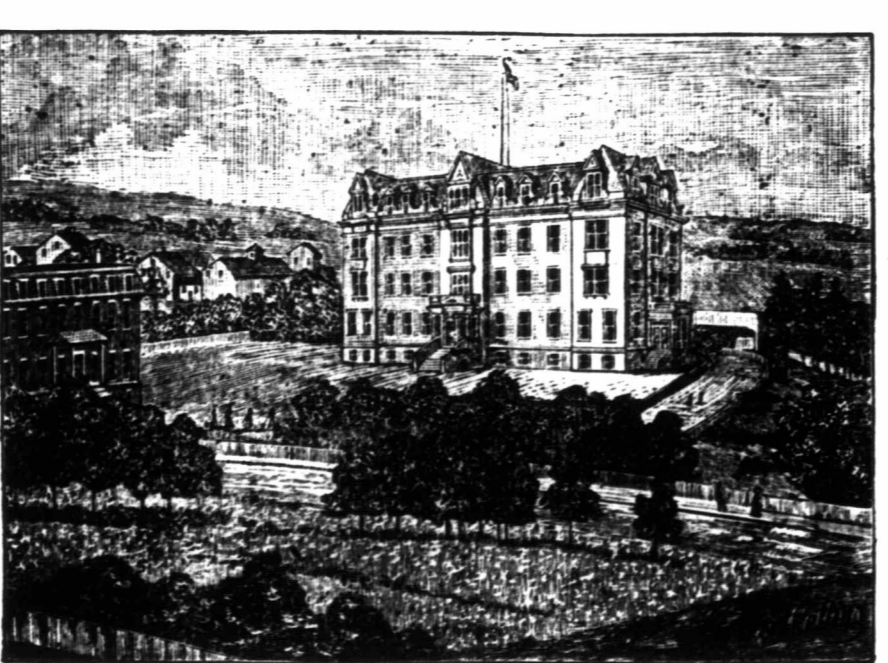
