Butter and Eggs

The receipts of eggs have been very large during the past week and the price paid by retailers has dropped another cent. The quotation at present is 18 cents a dozen. Choice dairy butter is quoted at 30c a pound, and there is a good demand at this figure.

Hog Quotations Reach \$10.25

Still another new high record price for hogs was reached last week when the quotation soared to \$10.25 per cwt. The bulge came at the end of last week, and despite the high price buyers snapped up every hog they could corral. Last week the total receipt for hogs numbered 2,162, and while they were not all of top quality, the packers were keen to take them at the top price. As to whether hog prices have reached their limit the shippers are uncertain. There are those that say that as hogs have taken a drop in the eastern and southern centres, that there will be a corresponding slump here. However, with farmers busy seeding and from the fact that many producers have shipped to the last notch, it is probable that the continued shortage will hold prices firm.

An idea of how keen the demand has been may be gained from the fact that on Friday last, some 808 hogs were received (the largest run of any one day for a long time) and the yards were cleaned out before 9.30 in the morning. During the past week choice weighty beefs brought as high as \$5.85 per cwt. while the bulk of sales ranged from \$4.00 to \$5.50. During the past week the receipts totalled 1,435 head of cattle, and of these about 55 were sent east for export.
