THE U. S. FLEET DEMONSTRATION.

A United States paper makes the boast that probably no other power could have so effectively made a fleet demonstration as Uncle Sam has in the case of Mexico. To feel pride in the prompt manner in which President Wilson took steps to vindicate the national honor in the matter of the unwarranted arrest of some of his marines, is, of course, natural, but to say that his display of force could not have been equalled by any other nation is ridiculous.

THE SUCCESSFUL DEMOCRAT RECEIVED.

The returns of last week's election show in round numbers: Drukker (Rep.) 10,500, O'Byrne (Dem.) 5150, Whitehead (Prog.) 600. 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POPULAR HEADMASTER BURIED
