They were intercepted by Indians and his two companions killed. He himsel was shot in the back and fell off his horse senseless. The firing was heard by the other emigrants, and a rescue party drove the savages away. reanwhile, they had scalped this young man, and when picked up the was at first supposed to be dead. was carried back and the next day turned over to some eastbound travelers, who took him to St. Louis. He told me it was over a year before the wound began to heal, but, of course, his memory may be at fault as to particulars. The wonderful part of it is that he recovered at all in those days, when skin grafting was practically un-known. He used to hide the scar with a toupee, or patch wig, but at present he is entirely bald and wears a tight-

fitting cap. "I dare say he is the only man in the world who ever survived such an ordeal.
