Frank Kelly and Walter Wing caught 18 fish at the Eau yesterday. The majority were black bass and they claim that some of them weighed five pounds.

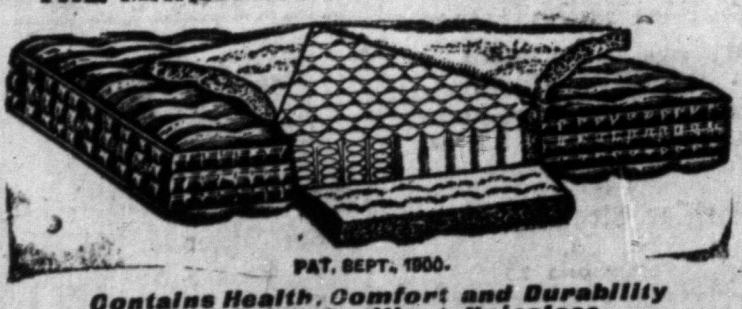
