It was near half past eight o'clock before John Holmes arrived. He had been kept waiting for his new uniform and Chatham's new Chief of Police made a splendid appearance as he marched into the office of the Canada Flour Mills Co. attired in a blue suit with the regulation braid marks swirling the front of the coat. One of the first to grasp the hand of the new Chief of Police was his cousin, James Holmes, County Clerk. The Irish member of the Holmes family said: "You looked so well in your suit you never knew do his duty without favor."

John Holmes replied: "I don't know you never will in my official capacity."

This repartee set the merry company laughing. At this point, Lillian's orchestra struck up "Little Boy Blue."

N. H. Stevens called the gathering to order and introduced the new Chief.

THE PRESENTATION.

John Ross Walker, master miller, read the following address after which Harry J. Stevens presented the Chief with a beautiful gold watch and chain:

John Holmes, Esq.,
Chief of Police,

Dear Sir,—We, the officers and employees of the Canada Flour Mills Co., Limited, are met here to-night to extend to you our hearty congratulations on your selection out of a score of more of applications and your appointment to the honorable and trusty position of Chief of Police of this your native city.

THE CHIEF'S REPLY.
Chief Holmes then thanked the donors as follows:
Mr. Stevens and Gentlemen—fellow employees of The Flour Mills: This is a very unusual position for me to be in. I wish I had the language to give expression to the pleasure and gratitude I feel for the very kind—altogether too kind—words and good wishes you have so feelingly extended to me in the address just read. This watch and chain are very beautiful and useful, and I appreciate and prize them highly, but far more than these do I appreciate the spirit and kindness and esteem that prompts this costly gift.

I do not feel myself to deserve this thoughtfulness on your part. During the seventeen years I have been employed at these mills, I met with nothing but kindness and encouragement from you Mr. Stevens and from my fellow employees.

This gathering here to-night and the pleasant things you have said and the kindly feeling exhibited, will be an inspiration and encouragement to me in the new duties which I have assumed. I wish I could make you understand how much I value your kind expressions. Again I thank you from the bottom of my heart, and wish you all many long years of health and happiness.

JUDGE HOUSTON.
Judge Houston said that Chatham had been highly favored in the securing of chief of police. Mr. Holmes was the third that he had worked with during the 20 years that he had been Police Magistrate. He had never had a poor chief of police. Colonel Barker had stopped rowdiness and made street fighting unpopular. Chief Young had made Chatham more orderly and had made this city the most law abiding city in place. He felt sure that the present Chief would carry on the good record of the two who had preceded. No one had ever questioned the present Chief's integrity and he certainly wasn't lazy. He had a good staff under him to assist him. The Judge had done his duty himself without fear or affection, and in so doing had made enemies. But he felt, in the end, it always paid a man to do his duty. In conclusion he congratulated Chatham

for the third time on getting a good chief of police.

MAYOR SULMAN.

The Mayor said that it was a pleasure to be present when a man, after holding a position for 17 years, was being honored by his employees. He was a neighbor for 14 years of John Holmes, and he could endorse all that had been said. The force would work harmoniously under the Chief of Police, the Mayor was sure, and the citizens are to be congratulated.

WILLIAM BALL.

William Ball endorsed all the previous speakers had said. Chatham was proud of her Chief of Police and her staff. John A. Walker, H. J. Stevens and James Innes each paid their tribute.

James Innes said that he hoped that the present Chief of Police would visit the west end of the town. The Mayor—He is needed there had enough.—Laughter.

MR. STEVENS.

N. H. Stevens thanked all for attending. Mr. Holmes had everything in his favor but all evil doers could rest assured that John Holmes would do his duty without favor. The present excellent order and lack of crime in this city was due to the work of such men as Judge Houston had described. He felt that the order of the city would improve with John Holmes as Chief of Police.
