## WAIF'S FRIEND HONORED

KING CONFERS KNJGHTHOOD UPON MR. JOHN KIRK.

Marked Fortieth Anniversary of His Work Among Slum Children-Quaint Incident at Buckingham Palace-King Was Alone at Work -Honor Was Unexpected - How Ceremony Was Performed.

The King recently conferred the honor of knighthood on Mr. John Kirk, organizer of the Fresh Air Fund and secretary of the Ragged School Union, on the fortieth anniversary of his work among the children of the slums.

The honor tell unexpectedly on Mr.

as a preliminary to the testimonial
which was to be presented to him by
the Lord Mayor. The Marquis of

BURGLARS BLOW BANK VAULT. Scared Off They Fled Firing on Their

Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 11.—A trio of safe-blowers made a raid on the Chippewa branch of the Royal Bank about 2.30 yesterday morning.

Gaining an entrance by prying open the side window and knocking off the combination handle of the safe they inserted dynamite and blew the fire-proof door from its fastenings, securing about \$20 in silver and copper deposited inside the fire-proof door. The bank's money on hand was in the burglar-proof locker inside the safe, but no doubt the trio was scared off before being able to make an attempt to get it by a couple of young men coming home from the country, who heard the explosion and ran down the street.

The young men saw the trio runining southward across the bridge over the creek and made chase when the fleeing burglars fired three shots at them. The Ontario police were notified, and all bridges were covered, but the trio made good their escape.

Before commencing operations, the burglars took the precaution of placing the village in darkness by cutting the electric light wires.

ARMY BALLOON GOES WRONG.

Makes Circle of Two Miles and Settles in Trees.

Farnborough, Eng., Sept. 11.—The new airship designed for the British army, following the example set by the French and Germans in aerial navigation, made an ascent from here yesterday in charge of Col. Capper, Capt. King and F. S. Cody, the American, who has spent a number of years in the British service, in charge of the kite section of the army.

After making a semi-circle of about two miles around Farnborough and Cove Common, an accident occurred to the engines and, in spite of the throwing out of ballast by the aeronauts, of which the airship carried 800 pounds, the dirigible balloon settled down into some trees. It was said that the defect which developed was only slight, and can easily be remedied.

The balloon portion of the airship is cigar-shaped, has a capacity of 7,500 cubic feet. The car is made of aluminum and canvas.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., Sept. II.—Monday afternoon Burt Carpenter went to the house of Mrs. Elizabeth Creighton, 30 years old, at Lewiston, and on her refusing to admit him he kicked the door in. Later he was arrested and spent the night in the lock-up. Yesterday morning Carpenter was arraigned in the police court and sentenced to 60 days in the Niagara County Jail. As he was being taken from the courtroom he met Mrs. Creighton, and before the officer could prevent it he shot her through the body. The woman was brought to a hospital in the city in a serious condition.

During the excitement, Carpenter escaped, but a posse of citizens went in pursuit of him.



TARGET SHOOTING.

Rainy Day Game That May Be Played on the Dining Table. Fig. 1 shows the target cut out of

Mg. 1 shows the target cut out of cigar box wood. A circular piece is first cut about one inch in diameter, and eight small round pieces of cardboard with the numbers 1 to 8 on them are mounted on toothpicks and grouped around it at even distances. The other ends of the toothpicks are then inserted in the sides of the circular piece of wood. The target itself is secured to a stick of wood about eight inches long, fastened to a stand, as shown in the picture. The about eight inches long, fastened to a stand, as shown in the picture. The gun consists of a paper tube, which is made by winding cardboard well covered with glue around the stem of a lead pencil. When it is dry, a piece about five inches long is cut off. One and three-quarter inches from one end make an incision about two inches



long, cutting down to about one-half of the thickness of the tube. See Fig. 2. Fig. 2 shows how a piece of whale-bone about six inches long is inbone about six inches long is inserted, acting as the propelling power
of the gun. You shoot with a wooden
peg about one and one-half inches long,
atting loosely into the barrel of the
gun. To give it more weight and
strength insert a carpet tack in one
end of the plug.

To shoot hold the gun with the right
hand mulling the whalebone back with

To shoot not the gui with the right hand, pulling the whalebone back with the index finger and inserting the peg. As soon as the index finger releases the whalebone it springs forward and forces the peg out. To aim well hold the tube in such a way that the whale-bone springs point downward.

THE COW'S HORN.

Information Concerning a Common but Useful Article.

Useful Article.

Have you any conception of how useful that horn is to us? Scientifically it is known as a combination of phosphate of lime, gelatin and albumen, and, like all nature's products, the ingredients are in the right proportion to make the article useful to man, as well as to the animal that bears it.

The lime makes the horn hard, but there is just enough lime to make it hard without making it brittle, and there is just enough lime to make it hard without making it brittle, and there is just enough gelatin to make the horn easy to cut and shape. The core of the horn is bone, and to get that out the horn is soaked in water for several weeks. When the core is taken out, it is ground up and made into crucibles which are used for melting gold and silver in.

The outer end of the horn is hard and solid, and that is used for making infie handles and other things. The
