International Bible Lesson for To-  
morrow—Jehoshaphat's Reform—II.  
Chron. 19, 1-11.

Golden Text—"Deal courageously  
and the Lord will be with the good."

Good King Asa was succeeded by  
his good son Jehoshaphat, aged 35,  
who reigned well over 25 years.  
On his return from a defeat-  
ed expedition, in which he united his  
forces with the wicked King Ahab of  
Israel against the Syrians, Ahab be-  
ing slain and Jehoshaphat barely es-  
caping with his life. Verse 2—He was  
met by the Prophet John, who boldly  
rebukes him for such an ungodly al-  
liance with Ahab; yet mercifully and  
wisely commends what God finds of  
good in him. Very few are altogether  
bad, and there may be much of  
good in those we think the worst  
characters. The way the king re-  
ceives the rebuke marks him as a  
noble character than Asa, his father,  
who imprisoned the prophet Hanani  
for reproving him for the same sin.  
Children should learn from and im-  
prove on their parents' experiences.  
It requires more moral courage to re-  
buke those in power—at personal risk  
—than to face bravely the Norse sea.  
Look at the captain of the bridge and  
his vessel sink under him the picture of  
a brave man; but in his employers' of-  
fice, before she sails, he fears to pro-  
test, with hundreds on board more  
than the law allows. What about  
rulers, Jehoshaphat sets himself dis-  
tinctly to reform his kingdom—for  
"righteousness exalteth a nation, but  
sin is a reproach to any people"—not  
by militarism, but by the wise ad-  
ministration of justice in the fear of  
God and without fear or favor of any  
man. See verse 7. We have in this  
lesson the judges and the religious  
teachers, under the king's personal  
supervision, charged with this moral  
religious reformation.

Verse 9—They were to act "in the  
fear of the Lord faithfully and with  
a perfect heart, and to deal courage-  
ously and the Lord shall be with the  
good." (In the Dominion this applies  
equally to all of us to-day and every  
day.) Of course, Satan stirred up op-  
position. Read the next chapter and  
see how God defeated it.
