A COSTLY EXPERIMENT WITH OCEAN PRESSURE.

Sink a bottle of champagne in the Sink a bottle of champagne in the ocean right side up, and it will come up full of salt water instead of champagne. Yet the cork*is there sound as ever. What happens evidently is this: The pressure of sea water equals about one atmosphere for every 30 feet in descent. When the bottle is down 3,000 feet the pressure is 100 atmospheres; or about 1,500 pounds to the square inch. The cork is squeezed together by that tremendous force, all the air it contains is pressed out, and it becomes considerably smaller than the neck of the bottle, thus admitting the salt water.
