Editorial Notes

A very important piece of legislation is now before the House singly or several in co-operation, to establish prison farms for such persons as commit acts against the laws of the province. The financial support of these farms is to be upon the municipalities the same as they now support the common jails. Such a regulation if put in operation could not fail to be of great assistance in the enforcement of law and is bound to be productive of great moral good in the community. The ACADIAN has for a long time urged that some arrangement be made that will improve the conditions of prison life and lessen the cost of law enforcement, and we gladly support the proposed law.

For many years the people of this province have been urging upon the gorvenment the need of making some provision for the segregation and care of the feebleminded members of our popula-tion. As the result of a very vigorous request from every part of the province, our rulers at Halifax have finally decided to take steps in that direction. A bill was in-troduced this week providing for the establishment of an institu-tion for feeble minded or mentally defective persons, with a view to providing facilities for the custody and scientific treatment and care and education of these


