Grave Cleavage in Labor Ranks

(Continued from page 1) men and Nationalists and replace the old racial and religious feuds by divisions of capital and labor.

The Dublin tramway strike is giving birth to an independent Irish labor party, led by James Larkin, an ex-Liverpool doctor. Larkin, who declares himself a rebel, saying "I recognize no law but the people's," is now in custody on a charge of provoking a riot and inciting the tramway workers to defeat the employers by refusing to pay rent until they get better wages and shorter hours.

The leaders of the capitalists is William Murphy, former Nationalist member for Dublin, and owner of a Nationalist newspaper. He is a railway contractor and an intimate friend and follower of Tim Healey.

Belfast and Cork labor men are watching the developments in Dublin. Four hundred Dublin employers last night took an extreme step and decided to refuse to employ any members of Larkin's labor organization. This affects another 6000 workmen, carriers, dockers and general laborers. Already whispers are heard of a sympathetic strike in Belfast, to call off the extra battalion of Royal Irish Constabulary who are being used to reinforce the Dublin metropolitan police.

Lord Aberdeen and the Lord Mayor of Dublin are being bitterly attacked by the labor leaders. Mr. J. Kier Hardie, who addresses the strikers daily, may be right in declaring that a great battle is imminent, which will sweep away the existing national Unionism and the issues which have so long dominated Ireland, and set new forces and new leaders in their place. Eight out of every ten Irish urban voters are working men.
