DELEGATIONS.—The New Brunswick anti-Union Delegates left for England last week. They are accompanied by Halifax by a Nova Scotia Delegation consisting of Dr. Tupper, and another member of the Government, whose mission is said to be in connection with railway matters.

The Hillsborough Committee are progressing favorably with their work. The walks are all completed—staff and British Esquimaux have been provided free of charge to the Committee—and seats are about being placed in proper positions to accommodate the public who assemble in large crowds every evening...

The Halifax Reporter of a late date, says:—There is a rumor afloat in the community that the Queen, by the advice of Her Government, proposes to confer the honor of Knighthood upon the defeated New Brunswick Delegates, to mark the respect entertained by the Imperial authorities, for those who, by seeking toward Imperial policy, have suffered loss of office.

THE QUEEN VICTORIA arrived at Pictou yesterday, with over one hundred and sixty passengers, from Quebec and other places. She returns early next week, direct to Montreal, to begin regular trips between that city and Halifax, touching, we believe, at Quebec, Gaspe and Pictou only.

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
