Appalling Disaster

Chicago, July 24—Hundreds of persons were drowned by the capsizing of the Steel steamer Fastland, at her dock in the Chicago River, shortly before eight o'clock yesterday morning. When the boat started to tip, the officers shouted warnings but it was too late. The heavily loaded steamer continued to roll until the hawsers which held it to the dock, snapped. A moment later amid the screams of passengers, the steamer turned over on its side, and floated out into the middle of the river. Apparently scores of women and children in the cabin, were drowned without being given a chance to escape. Hundreds of other passengers were able to climb up the side of the boat which is above water, and were later taken off by rescuers. Chicago July 25—The death ship tonight had given up 820 bodies. The estimated total of those who went down to death in the Chicago river yesterday morning when the steel steamer bearing 2,408 excursionists rolled over at her dock, remained at approximately one thousand. Of the total of 2,408 persons on board at the time of the catastrophe, 1,072, including the crew of 72, have reported themselves as safe. Of the 588 thus remaining unaccounted for, it is believed 400 are alive and that 188 bodies still are in the river.

Three Lost Their Lives.

Halifax, N. S. July 25—Three young men of Halifax were drowned, and one narrowly escaped death, by the upsetting of a rowboat in the harbor about midnight. The men who lost their lives were James Gerald Hann, electrician, 25 years of age; Clifford Long, about the same age, driver, and Frank Walsh, twenty years of age. The rescued man was Thomas R. James. The three drowned men were unmarred. These four men with several others were camping at Tuft's Cove on the eastern shore of the harbor. They had come to the city for the afternoon and evening, and were returning to camp by rowing across the harbor from Richmond in a small row-boat. Just what was the immediate cause of the accident it was difficult to learn tonight, as Thomas James the only one rescued, was in a state of nervous collapse and could give no coherent story. It was understood however that the men were shifting their seats in the boat and throwing too much weight on one side capsized the craft. Their cries attracted the attention of Frank Hann, the brother of one of the occupants of the boat, who was at the camp on the Tuft's Cove side, and a younger brother of Frank Walsh, who was also at the camp. They immediately put out for the scene of the accident, in about the middle of the harbor. When they reached the spot, Hann, Long and Walsh had disappeared and James was clinging to the upturned boat when rescued, and in a very exhausted condition.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$8.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
