

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

RUSSIANS AGAIN PREPARING.

LONDON, Jan. 11. Confirming the previous reports that the Bolsheviki are preparing to re-establish the fighting power of the army against a possible final break in the negotiations with the Central Powers, the Petrograd correspondent of the Daily News says that they are not attempting to reanimate the old worn-out army, but to create a new and much smaller one. Concerning this new army Foreign Minister Trotzky is reported to have said it will wage not war, but revolution. Its front trenches will be barricaded against oppressors. The Bolsheviki doubt if the German soldiers will advance, but if they do and take more territory, they will be no nearer an end of the war. The correspondent says that the greatest difficulties of the Bolsheviki in these preparations are transports and supply, of which the former is the less hopeful question. Ensign Kryletke, the Bolsheviki Commander-in-Chief is reported to be organizing a volunteer army, and has ordered all officers to return to their posts they held before the Bolsheviki

CENTRAL POWERS WITHDRAW PEACE TERMS.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 11. The Central Powers have withdrawn their peace terms made public at Brest-Litovsk conference on December 25th, it was announced by Dr. Kuehlmann, Foreign Secretary, in his speech at Brest-Litovsk conference with the Russians yesterday. Owing to the non-acceptance by all the enemy powers of these terms. Dr. Von Kuehlmann stated that the document had become null and void.

WILL ONLY CONFER AT BREST.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 11. Count Czernin, Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, discussing the situation of the peace conference a Brest-Litovsk on Thursday, said that as Russia's allies had not replied to the invitation to participate in the negotiations, it was now a question of a separate peace between Russia and the Central Powers. He gave reasons for not wishing to transfer negotiations to neutral territory, and said that if the Russians were animated Powers, the result of the negotiation would be satisfactory; if not, the responsibility for the war would fall exclusively on the Russians.
