Garland's Bookstore Entered and Money and Valuables Stolen

Safe Opened and Cash Desk Rifled—Watches, Bracelets and Fountain Pens Also Taken—Safe Old-Fashioned—Mr. Garland Out of Town—Detectives Hot on Trail.

For the third time this summer S. E. Garland's Bookstore on Water Street was broken into last night by some thief or thieves.

On the two former occasions the burglars entered by underground back room, and did not venture up stairs to the ground floor, on a level with Water Street. Only such goods as inks, etc., were kept there and nothing was taken.

This time, however, the thieves were bolder and broke into a back window into the office. There is an arch between Garland's and Chaplin the tailor's, which leads to a small back yard behind the bookstore. The office window is about 15 feet above the ground, and some bare boxes there were piled up and used for ascension. A small hole was broken into the pane of glass, enough to enable the burglar to insert his arm and turn back the catch that locked the window frame. This opened he or they entered the office, which is back of the store. The safe, which is an old-fashioned one, inset into the wall, to the right of the door leading from the shop, has a very heavy iron door in addition to the door inside. This outside door does not lock nor has it a combination arrangement. A simple bolt, when twisted, opens the door. The next door, however, contains a heavy lock, opened by a key. This key was in the possession of Mr. McCordle, the oldest employee of the store, Mr. S. E. Garland having given it to him before he left for Come-By-Chance on Monday to do some fishing. It is the only key in existence and was in Mr. McCordle's possession last night.

All the money in the safe was taken, while many valuable watches, bracelets, fountain pens and other valuables were also stolen. The fixtures were hauled out and the safe bore all the signs that a systematic search had been made. The thief or thieves must have now turned his or their attention to the private desk of Mr. Garland in his private office just off the main office. This was broken open and its contents rifled. Not yet satisfied, the burglars entered the shop and broke open the cash booth, stealing the money in one of the drawers. There was not a big amount of money in this, however, being only money taken in for newspapers.

There can be no doubt that the burglary was carried out by one or some intimately informed of the layout and situations of the store, and the fact that he or they entered by means of the backboxes points to their being strong and nimble.

The robbery was discovered this morning by Mr. McDonald, the shop foreman, when he opened the store. He immediately informed the police and sent for Mr. McCordle. Detective Head Constable Byrne was assigned to the case and immediately got hot on the trail. Not many clues were left and there was not much to work on, but if the burglar can be caught Detective Byrne will catch him.

Mr. Garland was notified by wire of the occurrence and will probably arrive in town to-night. Only he knows how much was in the safe and his own desk, so that the total of the burglary is not yet known to the police.

It would seem to be conclusive that the robbery was planned out in a systematic manner by one or ones who knew the plan of the office and store, and it would also seem as if there were more than one on the job, as at least one would have to remain outside to watch for the police or watchman. That they were a cool and bold party is proven by the fact that, after the robberies had been committed, they went upstairs and, sitting around, counted the spoils and smoked a quantity of cigarettes. Certain footmarks on parcels and packages in the office may possibly prove their undoing.

Of late many robberies have been going on and it cannot be doubted that this is a gang of thieves in the city that has set out to carry out such robberies.

For the safety of the city, therefore, the quicker they are apprehended and punished the better.


