American Sea Power.

General Board of the Navy has had its recommendation for an fighting force equal to that of other nations. Our naval power broadened by the war. Up to we had a relatively small going merchant marine. Now we have a large one. The Navy of the future will have to protect it as our coasts and island possessions.

is first in rank. In the first weeks of the war Germany lost or was obliged to intern most of her big ocean carriers. She was also compelled to lay up her surface warships in home waters. Her big maritime investment was nearly valueless and she had to turn to the submarine as her only possible weapon of offence against Allied sea power.

If the United States expects to be called on to protect its merchantmen and foreign commerce as well as its coasts and island dependencies against all comers, it will naturally have to create a navy equal to the best in existence.

The naval general board sticks in the main, and sensibly, to its before-hand-war plans for a surface fleet. It recommends for 1921 the construction of two battleships (super-dreadnoughts) and one battle-cruiser. Yet it is significant of the drift of things that the board asks for ten scout cruisers and five super-destroyers. Ships of this sort came to the fore in the surface operations of the war. They are probably the real link between the surface navy of to-day and the surface navy of the future.

Sea power may be lodged more and more in the lighter and faster ships and in aircraft, rather than in the old floating fortresses. That is the puzzle of to-morrow. Yet whatever form sea power takes the United States cannot afford to lag behind. If nations remain competitors on land and sea we must be as strongly armed for that competition as any possible rival is. From the New York Tribune.

Island People. The German ex-Crown Prince, it seems, is still at Wieringen. But if a referendum were held among the inhabitants of Wieringen the island would soon be rid of him. Even the feeling of the humblest peasant is decidedly against a prolonged stay of the uninvited guest.

"Little Willie" caused a small commotion in the island in the beginning; but now each man goes his way without taking any notice of the illustrious personage. It is true that he walks in "klompen," or wooden shoes, and that he "pals up" to the villagers; but these things he must do, otherwise he would be miserable beyond belief. That is the consensus of opinion among the Wieringers.

But, says one of the island notables, he is as hypocritical as ever. His handling of the plough and his work at the village blacksmith's are a make-believe—another manifestation of his old craving for popularity.

And the village belles of Oosterland will have none of his haughtiness, none of his philandering.

But why Willie is scattering his bounties broadcast, giving sweets to the little children, and occasional presents to their parents.
