

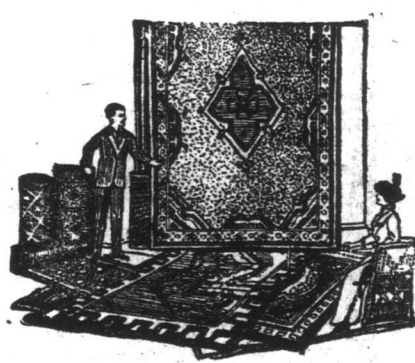

Raw Meat Juice for Tuberculosis

"CAVE MAN DIET" ADVOCATED AS CURE AT ACADEMY OF SCIENCES.

PARIS, May 20.—His new method of treating tuberculosis by feeding the patients pure dried juice from raw meat was described to the Academy of Sciences last evening by Prof. Charles Richet, famous physiologist and winner of the Nobel prize for medicine in 1913.

Prof. Richet applied his method in hospital work during the war with most encouraging results. One hundred patients treated by the professor steadily increased in weight for two months, their gain being attributed to reconstruction of muscular tissues wasted by tuberculosis.

Prof. Richet has long advocated a "cave man diet" as the only one according strictly to the dictates of physiology. His experiment with dogs have shown that those fed exclusively with raw meat flourish while others, fed cooked meat, decline and die within a relatively short time.

As it is impossible for tubercular patients to take raw meat in sufficient quantities it must be replaced with the juice which he says possesses the same therapeutic qualities and can be taken in large doses without inconvenience. He administers about 100 grams daily to a patient. The treatment, he claims, is equally good for anemic children and in cases of convalescence.

Our Recent Vestry Meeting.

"At a full attendance of the Vestry, last Monday evening, May 6th, when much business was transacted, a resolution was unanimously passed congratulating Mr. John S. Taylor, Rector's Lay Assistant, on his approaching Ordination to the Diaconate, to take place in St. Stephen's Church, Wilkesburg, Sunday morning, July 28th, 1924, at 11:00 a.m. He has, in obedience to conviction, made a very substantial financial sacrifice to give his life to the ministry of our church. It is of more than ordinary interest to further note that he has been associated with St. Stephen's as a worker for twenty-four years, and a very active Lay Reader in the Diocese for quite a long period. His main occupation has been that of Head Instructor, for eighteen years, in the Carnegie Technical Schools, having succeeded in building up his Department wonderfully. We are proud to state that Mr. Taylor has been unanimously called to be Rector of Trinity Church, Rochester, Pa., and will begin immediately after his Ordination. The Rochester Parish is leaving no stone unturned in making the Rector, inside and out, attractive and comfortable for Mr. and Mrs. Taylor, and also financial provision that indicates distinct pride in the coming of their new Rector and his wife. The Altar Guild members of our own Parish have shown, as usual, they are magnanimously alive, for through their own personal contributions, and skilled work, they are making an exquisite linen Surplice, which they will present to Mr. Taylor. The Vestry are to furnish him with a Cassock, Girdle and a set of Stoles. This will be the second candidate for the Ministry that Dr. Porges has had the great joy of presenting. The greatest pleasure of all has been this week, when the Rector of St. Stephens wrote a special congratulatory letter to Mr. Taylor's dear mother, who is in Newfoundland in her 84th year. How full of joy her heart must be with regard to her worthy son. May God abundantly bless her, and may He also make that son, my dear brother in the Ministry, a winner of many souls for the Master's Kingdom."

The above is under the heading "Rector's Notes," and it speaks for itself.

The continued advancement and success of Mr. Taylor has been noted, with much interest, from time to time, by his many friends here, and we may all feel justly proud of this worthy son of Terra Nova. Mr. Taylor, with his wife (nee Miss Minnie Davis) and their two children, spent last summer in the home town, during which they, on different occasions, Mr. Taylor took charge of the services at Christ Church, and also at St. Paul's.

We tender our congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Taylor, and his dear mother, and trust that our highly esteemed former townsman may see many years of service in the Master's Vineyard.

London Police Changing

COLLEGE GRADUATES NOW BEING GIVEN CHANCE TO SWING CLUBS.

The day, when London's police force was made up of a stalwart though ignorant recruit from the East Side has passed. The beer-drinking hercules with the Cockney accent is stepping aside to allow the university graduate a chance to carry a whistle and a club. It now takes more than six feet of brawn to qualify for a pair of thick boots. The policeman's duty is now a profession in London.

Once, before the war, a man joined the London force when he could not get anything else to do. The policemen in those days earned 30 shillings a week, he worked ten hours a day for seven days a week and he had no recreation centres at his disposal. 30 shillings, even in the days when a shilling knew a lot more tricks than it does to-day, hardly sufficed to keep a family. The guardian of the public welfare was always ready then to accept a tip for any little service he might perform.

Now the pay is good, the chances of promotion to responsible jobs are many and the conditions and hours of service easier. The municipal authorities are taking an interest in their police force. They have provided clubs for the men and their families, they are given better uniforms, and promotions and salary increases are granted for educational attainments, as well as meritorious service.

At the same time the law of supply and demand has raised the standard of requirements. The candidate must pass a stiff educational examination, and he must know more English than is contained in the yellow penny thriller,
