

### Raw Meat Juice for Tuberculosis

"CAVEMAN DIET" ADVOCATED AS CURE AT ACADEMY OF

PARIS, May 20.—His new method of treating tuberculosis by feeding the patients pure dried juice from raw meat was described to the Academy or Sciences last evening by Prof. Charles Richet, famous physiologist and winner of the Nobel prize for medicine in 1913.


