

Turner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Turner, St. Andrew street returned home from overseas last Sunday, after nearly three years of service with the C. A. M. C. er who has the rank of Lieutenant, is a graduate nurse of Victoria hospital, London, and in 1916 enlisted with the 10th Canadian Stationary Hospital Unit, otherwise known as the Western University Medical Corps, and on June 22nd, 1916, sailed for England. They were seventeen days crossing the Atlantic and on arriving in England were given six days of sight seeing. On July 12th she went to France and was stationed at No. 1 Canadian General Hosoital, Etables, which was also a clearng station for the wounded. Her arrival in France was just at the time of the heaviest fighting on the Somme in which the Canadians suffered heavy casualties, and the doctors and nurses, labored almost day and night, and note the speedy improve- looking after the wounded. After twenty months at Etaples she was transferred to Calais where she labored for thirteen months. It will be remembered that Calais was an objective which the Germans were partcularly anxious to capture, for they thought it would then give them a better opportunity to strike at England. Consequently Calais was besieged with air raids and during her stay there 1030 bombs were dropped on the city. The Germans seemed to take delight in bombing the hospital and the staff experienced many narrow escapes. On one occasion the hospital kitchen was completely wiped out with bombs. Mss Turner visited many battlegrounds in France and says the ountry is completely ruined. Canada have no idea what the French and Belgium people have suffered, and cannot realize what our Canadian boys have gone through. She spent a month in England before returning home, where she visited her brother Mark L. Turner, of Edmonon, who is still at Witley camp. She has been given her discharge and will spend a few weeks at home enjoying well-earned rest.
