Talbot Road from Aylmer to St. Thomas, is now open with the excep-tion of the two miles between Orwell and New Sarum, where a new bridge is being built at Orwell. This means a detour around this section. bridge is completed at New Sarum and it is expected that in a few weeks the road will be opened clear through. The cement pavement has been completed for three weeks. The Brennan Construction Company, of Hamilton, who built the road, claim to have made a record, over five miles of pave ment in seven weeks. The company still has men at work grading the five foot shoulder at each side of the cement, and this will soon be completed.
