—The Seventh Fusiliers band have not-

UNDER THE SEMAPHORE.

Boom in Grand Trunk Shares—Reports
of Union With C. P. Discarded.

The following special cable published in
Monday evening's Montreal Star was largely
commented on. It reads: "LONDON, July 13.
—Mr. Duncan McIntyre's election to the
Grand Trunk Board has been a surprise. The
company's shares up with a
bound. All manner of wild rumors
have been afloat concerning the man-
aging of the election. It is the result of a direct
outcome of the recent shareholders' dis-
satisfaction respecting the prospects of the
company. 'We have,' they say, 'all the
we want in the way of connections. We
have a good plant, good lines, and immense
receipts, but quite inadequate profits.' It
is felt that this last deficiency is to be
corrected materially by serious changes in the
London Board. The management in Canada,
it is claimed here, has naturally fallen
into a groove and needs bringing more into
line with modern methods. Sir Robert
Gillespie resigned some of the large
shareholders, whose only desire is to se-
cure a more profitable investment, urged
upon the board and Mr. McIntyre, who has
said him, as well as to write upon the im-
pending union between the Grand Trunk
and Canadian Pacific may be dismissed as
idle. If the Grand Trunk directors are able
to interest their company to secure
better harmony they may do so, but the
suggestion that Mr. McIntyre joins the
board to represent the Canadian Pacific in-
terests is quite unfounded."

A new conductor's ticket will shortly be
introduced on the M. C. R. The ticket
will be in duplicate and provided with rows
of figures representing dollars, dimes and
cents, and the conductor is required to
punch out on the ticket given to the pas-
senger, as well as on the duplicate retained
in his ticket pocket, the amount of money
paid him, as well as to write upon the du-
plicate the stations from and to which the
passenger was traveling.
