THE WEATHER PROPHET.
TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 30—11 a.m.—The pres-
sure is considerably above the average over
Canada from the lakes to the Gulf of St. Law-
ence, and also over the extreme Northwest
Territories, while between, over Manitoba and
Saskatchewan, there is an important
area of low pressure. In Alberta and Sasina-
boia the weather is cold, with rain, and snow
is falling, but in other parts of Canada it is
fine.
Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 32°-38°; Prince Albert, 30°-42°; Qu-
Appelle, 31°-43°; Winnipeg, 32°-48°; Toronto,
42°-58°; Montreal, 42°-58°; Quebec, 42°-64°;
Halifax, 62°-68°.
Local temperatures—Highest, 62°; lowest, 42°.
TORONTO, Oct. 1—1 a.m.—The indications
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region
governing the peninsula and as far east as
Belleville are: Fresh to strong east to south
winds; fair, cool weather.

Ontario W. C. T. U.
The fourteenth annual meeting of the
Ontario Women's Christian Temperance
Union will be held in Toronto, Oct. 27, 28,
29 and 30. This meeting will be composed
of the Executive Board, two delegates for
each affiliated union and one additional dele-
gate for every twenty paying members of such
union. The entertainment of all officers
and delegates will be provided for by the
Toronto W. C. T. U. The prize banner
will be awarded to the county having the
largest number of affiliated members ac-
cording to its population. The unions are
asked to be as careful as possible in return-
ing correct statistics. Arrangements for
reduced fares have been made with the rail-
way companies.
