Poison Plants and How to Know Them.

All other vines, that in any way resemble the poison ivy, have five leaflets. Poishould be bathed in carbolized soap and witch hazel and ban-daged, so that by no chance could they touch the face. Should this poison reach the eyes the sight might be de-

The only other plant of our nor-thern woods that is poisonous to the touch, is the poison elder or sumac. It is a small tree growing from six to twelve feet in hight. (The leaves are compound, with eleven to thirteen nar-row leaflets, arranged in pairs, on either side the mid-rib, which gives it an attractive palm-like appearance much like the true sumac. The worst cases of poisoning from this plant have come from cutting canes, for the long, smooth rods, of the thickness of the thumb, look to be just the thing for fishing poles. In a case of poisoning from the sumac the treatment should be the same as for poison ivy.

All other poisonous plants must be eaten to do mischief. One of the most common is a species of flag that is mis-taken for the calamus. It has the same soft white pith at the end of a blade-like leaf. Nearly all poisonous plants look like wholesome ones. The wild parsnip is a deadly poison, yet it cannot be distinguished from the par-snip of the garden, in taste or smell, or appearance. Wild parsley is also a dangerous cousin of the cultivated plant. The leaves are not curly-edged like the garden parsley. Hemlock, however, is easily recognized. It has a large, coarse, compound leaf, deeply notched and with curly edges. The odor is strong and disagreeable, so that the smell of it makes many people dizzy. The seeds attract children who mistake them for the seeds of the caraway. The plant grows in damp, waste places and around old stables, and the poison is the same as that of tobacco and toadstools. The water hemlock, commonly called the spotted cow-bane or beaver poison, belongs to the same family. It grows from two to six feet high in swamps, and the leaves are striped with a dusky, brownish purple. The antidote for hemlock poisoning is to provoke vomiting with warm water and mustard or ipecac. Stimulate with brandy and coffee and call the doctor

Monk's hood, which belongs to the aconite family, tastes like the horseradish. It bears a handsome cluster of purple flowers in shape like a monk's hood, and is perfectly harmless to pluck, but the smallest particle of it, if eaten, is a deadly polson. The treat-ment is the same as for hemlock pol-

Indian tobacco is the most familian of the lobelia family, every member of which is poisonous. It is an herb with milky, bitter, puckery juices. The stems are hairy, and the broad leaves much like the mullein to the touch, and like the mullein the leaves diminish in size toward the top. The dust from the lo-belia will often irritate the throat. If eaten, the Indian tobacco first causes vomiting and then paralysis. Vomiting should be hastened and the collapse

prevented by stimulants.

The jimson (Jamestown) weed is probably well known to most boys, with its broad, coanse, dark leaves, and its white and pale lilac bell-like flowers. Little girls usually admire them, and think them a kind of morning glory. The poison is narcotic, like opium. The antidote is to induce vomiting, use stimulants and keep the victim from going to sleep. Another very common plant is the American white hellebore, which is not a hellebore at all, but be-longs to the hily family. It looks like the lifty of the valley or Solomons' seal, with its broad parallel-veined leaves, and its spike of green flowers. The root is bitter and produces violent vom-

The Jerusalem artichoke is a species of field sunflower, with a yellow rayed flower and fuzzy stem and leaves. The root looks like a potato or arti-choke, and tastes much like the latter.
