Hegira of the Chinese Rulers

Imperial Household Left Pekin August 11.

Kang-Yi Leading an Army to Intercept the Pursuing Allied Forces-Prince Chang in Command at Pekin-He Welcomes the Allies in a Friendly Manner-Chinese Themselves Report Heavy Losses in Recent Fights-Two Generals Slain.

New York, Aug. 20 .- Kang Yi, former the entrance of the allies into Pekin assistant grand secretary of the empire, and Gen. Lung Fuh Si are heading an army that is advancing from Pekin to the southeast, with the object of diverting the allies from pursuit of the emperor and the dowager empress. says a cablegram to the Journal and Advertiser from Shanghai, Aug. 19. DEPARTURE OF THE IMPERIAL

HOUSEHOLD. On Saturday, Aug. 11, the imperial household left Pekin. Prince Tuan led the march with his troops, taking the emperor, the dowager empress and all the Manchu nobles. Their destination is believed to be Signan Fu, in the Shensi Province. With them left all the elements hostile to foreigners. Prince Ching was left in command at Pekin, and he welcomed the allies in a friendly manner. These reports are from Chinese sources.

DOZEN CLANSMEN BEHEADED. The empress dowager beheaded twelve of the imperial clansmen who

refused to leave the capital, and were suspected of favoring the foreigners. The personal property which the empress dowager sent away filled 60 carts. Her retinue went on foot owing to the hurried advance of the al-

Yu Sien, governor of Shen Si, has gone to the frontiers of his province w meet the empress.

CHINESE LOSSES HEAVY. The Chinese report heavy losses in the fighting between Tien Tsin and Pekin, Gen. Ueng Hang was wounded at Pei Tseng, and died the next day. Gen. Mah was dangerously wounded at Tung Chu, where Gens. Chentcelin and Chang Cheng Fu, commanding Wu Lus vanguard were killed. The Chinese are also circulating a story that the egation guards, owing to cartridges giving out, fired silver bullets during

the last days. WU TING FANG'S STATEMENT. New York, Aug. 20 .- "China recognizes the emperor and the empress dowager as her rulers. They are the government of China. I sincerely trust that the powers will do nothing to remove the present ruler from the government of

STREET FIGHTING IN PEKIN. London, Monday, Aug. 20-4:20 a.m.-Rear Admiral Bruce cables the admiralty from Che Foo, Aug. 19, as follows: 'Am informed on authority of the Japanese that street fighting still continues in Pekin, part of which is on fire. Yang Sa (?) prevented the empress from leaving, and a last stand is now being made in the inner city, which is surrounded by the allies and being bombarded.'

A WARNING.

The mandarins in the southern provinces, according to a dispatch to the Daily Express from Hong Kong, have issued an important statement, recognizing the capture of Pekin as a just punishment of reactionary officials, and warning the people not to interfere with foreigners, but also pointing out that the sole object of the powers should be the punishments of the Boxand then the restoration of peace confining, however, their operations to the north.

Emperor Nicholas has wired to Gen. Linevitch, commander of the Russian troops in the Province of Pe Chi Li, congratulating him heartily upon the rapid capture of Pekin, and bestowing upon him the third class Order of St. The Russian Emperor also George. thanks Vice-Admiral Alexieff and the heroic Siberian troops.

RUSSIAN SUCCESSES.

M. Ketels, Belgian vice-consul, confirms the report of the bombardment and the capture of New Chwang by

ussians. Gen. Grodokoff, Russian commander of the Amur Government, reports to the Russian war office that Chingan Pass was captured Aug. 16, after a bloody battle, in which the Chinese suffered heavily, losing four or five guns. The Siberian cavalry were in pursuit of the enemy.

The principal Russian papers, notably the Novoe Vremya, commenting upon the victory of Pekin, declare that Russia should go no further in participating in common armed intervention, but should limit her military action to the frontier and the Mancurian railing.

Gen. Grodokoff, says the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times, tele-graphs a remarkable fact, which must be taken as a premonitory notice of what is probably to follow. The Russians have now conquered the right bank of the Amur, which therefore is no longer the frontier, but an internal river of the Russian Empire.

Capture of Pekin.

Tokio, Aug. 18.—Gen. Yamaguchi

wires Pekin under date of Aug. 16, as follows: "Allies attacked Pekin early yesterday morning, opening with artillery on the eastern side. The wall was obstinately held by the enemy. Japanese and Russians were on the northward of Tung Chow Canal. The Americans and British were on the south side. At nightfall the Japanese blew up the two eastern gates of the Tartar city and entered. In the meantime the Americans and British entered the Chinese city by the Tung Pien gates. Detachments of each force were sent towards the legations. The parties met near the legations and opened communication. All the ministers and their staffs were found safe. The Japanese loss was over 100 killed, including three officers. The losses of the allies have not been ascertained. Four hundred Chinese were killed."

INNER CITY BOMBARDED. Washington, Aug. 19.—The navy department has received the following legram: "Che Foo .- Bureau of Navi_ gation, Washington, D. C.: Taku 18.— The telegraph line to Pekin is interrupted. Information from Japanese sources is to the effect that the dowager is detained by Prince Yung Ede in the inner city, which is being bombarded by the allies. Chaffee reports he entered the legation grounds on the evening of the 14th. Eight wounded during the day's fighting. Otherwise all well.—(Signed) Rémy."

The war department has received the following dispatch: "Che Foo, Aug. 19, via Pekin, Aug. 15.—We entered the legation grounds at 5 o'clock last night with the 14th and light battery.
