GRANTED EXTENSION OF LEASE!

Port Stanley Board Accepted the Walker Offer

On Certain Conditions—Only Three Directors Were Opposed.

At a meeting held Saturday night, the Port Stanley Railway board accepted the offer of the Walkers to pay \$17,500 for the road for the remaining thirteen years and \$20,000 a year for the extra seventeen years, provided that satisfactory terms are made in the new lease. The decision was made on a vote of 7 to 3, the latter being Ald. Jolly, ex-Ald. Pritchard and Ald. Beattie, the years being Mayor Rumball, Ald. Winnett, Stevely, Cronyn, Greenlees, Messrs. Mattinson, and Bartlett.

By a unanimous vote it was decided to reconsider the matter, this being necessary because of the deadlock that occurred at the previous meeting. Ald. Winnett then moved that the Walkers' offer be accepted, on the understanding that satisfactory terms regarding rates and other matters be secured. In amendment, Ald. Jolly moved, with the same proviso, that the extension be granted on a yearly rental of \$20,000, from Jan. 1, 1901, to the end of the 30 years.

The mayor made a resume of his stand in the matter, and said that unless the board got all that it wanted, the extension would not be granted. Opinions favorable to the renewal were expressed by Ald. Cronyn, Ald. Stevely and Mr. Walter Bartlett, who had come to believe that the citizens desired it. Ald. Jolly did not agree with this, nor did ex-Ald. Pritchard, and Ald. Beattie. Indeed, the latter was wholly opposed to extension on any terms.

Ald. Jolly's amendment having been decided, the motion was put with the above result. The next important matter will be the consideration of satisfactory terms for the new lease.

The Glasgow Exhibition.

London, March 16.—The Glasgow Exhibition will be opened at Kelvingrove Park early in May by the Duke and Duchess of Fife. The object of the exhibition is "To give a full illustration by the British Empire of its defense, its dominions and its colonies, and the progress of industry, science and art of all nationalities during the nineteenth century."

Official support has been obtained from Canada, Russia, France, Austria, Japan, Morocco, Persia, Denmark, India, West Australia, Queensland, British South Africa and South Australia. The czar has granted a Russian subsidy of \$150,000. Hundreds of Russian workmen have been erecting six pavilions for a month past. France expects to have 400 exhibitors. The other countries referred to will display their exhibits in separate sections.

The main building will be an industrial hall covering six acres, a machinery hall and a concert hall. American, Russian, German and Greek bands have been engaged in addition to the best British regiments. The educational progress of the century, especially in regard to the training of the blind, will also be illustrated. The section devoted to sports will include cycling, running tracks, etc.
