# ARE INVADING CAPE COLONY!

Small Garrison Hold Enemy at Bay Twelve Hours.

The Burghers Get Away Before British Reinforcements Reach the Scene.

Cape Town, June 28 .- Boer invaders, under Malan and Smit, about 3,000 strong, attacked Richmond early Tuesday morning. The town was defended by a detachment of the North Staffordshire militia, under Capt. Hawkeshaw, and the town guard. Three sangars outside the town were captured by the Boers, the garrison being distributed principally at Jail Fort and Flagstaff Hill Fort. Owing to the capture of the sangars, Flagstaff Hill Fort was exposed to a heavy fire. Three times during the day Commandant Malan sent nessengers demanding the surrender of the town, and each time the demand

BOERS ENTER THE TOWN. The Boers took advantage of the opportunity during cessation of hostilities to better their positions, and on the last occasion, when the messenger was sent in, a party of burghers entered the town and effected the capture of a sangar in the market square. Not shot was fired on account of the white flag carried by the messenger.
The Boers, who were now only 200
yards from Jail Fort, were securely covered, and directed a continuous fire for two hours upon the defenders, who stoutly held the position.

BOERS WITHDRAW. Finding it impossible to capture Jail Fort or Flagstaff Hill Fort, the Boers turned their attention to another sangar in the town, which was held by eight men. These eight men, after having held the position for 11 hours, surrendered at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. After dark the British garrison strengthened the fortification, as they anticipated a renewal of the attack in the morning. During the night, however, the Boers learned that relief was approaching for the besieged men and withdrew. They captured twelve

horses and looted the stores. The engagement lasted twelve hours. The Boer loss is reported as five men killed and seven wounded. The Boit wounded. The Brit. On Wednesday morning Col. Lunds, with a relieving column entered the

town. THE PATROL ESCAPED. Cape Town, June 28.-A patrol of six Cape police and twelve Dordrecht volunteers unexpectedly encountered a portion of Fouche's commando, north of Jamestown. The Boers endeavored to outflank the British, who retreated, fighting from kopje to kopje, for nine hours, finally reaching Aliwal North unscathed. The corporal commanding has been promoted.

KRUGER ADVISED TO SURREN-DER. Vienna, June 27.-The Neue Wiener Journal today states that former President Kruger, of the Transvaal, recently renewed his appeal for intervention in South Africa to Germany and Russia. All three of the powers, the paper states, after an interchange of opinions, advised Mr. Kruger to arrange for the immediate submission of

> Montreal, June 27.-Andrew Allan, head of the Allan Steamship Line, died this evening, aged 79. He had been in ill-health for some time.

Mr. Allan was born at Saltcoats, Scotland, on Dec. 1, 1822, and was the fourth son of the late Captain Alex. Allan, successful shipmaster trading between the Clyde and the St. Lawrence. Mr. Andrew Allan came Canada in his seventeenth year, and in 1846 joined his brother, the late Sir Hugh Allan, and the late Mr. William Edmonstone, importers and general merchants in Montreal. The firm established a line of fast-sailing packets for the passenger and freight traffic between Canada and the United Kingdom. In 1853 they began to add steamships to their fleet, and they were the founders of the Montreal Ocean Steamship Company, which now comprises many branches and includes among its vessels some the staunchest and best known steamers in the Atlantic trade. On the death of Sur Hugh Allan in 1882, Mr. Andrew Allan succeeded him in the presidency of the company, and likewise in the presidency of the Merchants' Bank and of the Montreal Telegraph rpool Company.
