THE STRAIN ON RAILWAYS

Handicap of Wintery Weather Shown in
C. P. R. Statement.

Montreal, Jan. 29.—The serious effect of a severe winter on the railways is well exhibited by the financial statement of the Canadian Pacific for December. Although the gross earnings of the system amounted to almost \$5,000,000, and showed a handsome increase over the returns for December of the previous year, so great was the cost of operating the line that there was an actual falling off in net profits of almost \$1,000,000, which was caused by an increase of almost half a million in working expenses, almost entirely due to snow and frost.

The figures for the month, which is one of the quietest in the year, are sufficiently imposing. During the month the gross earnings of the road were \$5,992,098, as compared with \$5,619,182 in 1905, an increase of \$372,916. The working expenses during the same period were \$2,728,503, as compared with \$2,722,599 last year, an increase of \$5,904. Thus the net profits for last December were only \$2,263,594, a decrease of \$80,988 from the \$2,344,583 profits earned in December, 1905.

Since the first of July the gross earnings of the Canadian Pacific were \$37,461,474, as compared with \$31,331,977 during the same six months of 1905. The net profits of the road during that period last year amounted to \$14,585,866, as compared with \$12,157,599 in the previous year, a gain of \$2,428,267.

While having no disposition to till the soil, they have shown themselves to be good workers in other pursuits. The Indians of the north were of a much finer type than those found elsewhere. Mr. Crosby was instrumental in founding the Crosby Home for girls, where protection was afforded girls who were frequently disposed of by the chiefs for large sums.
