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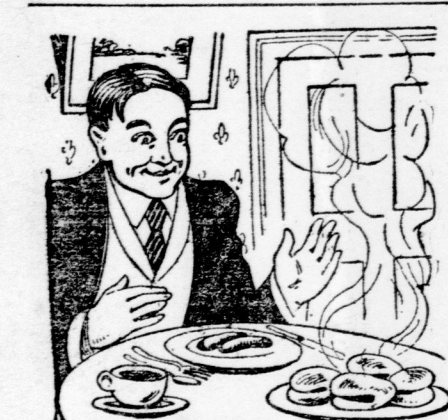

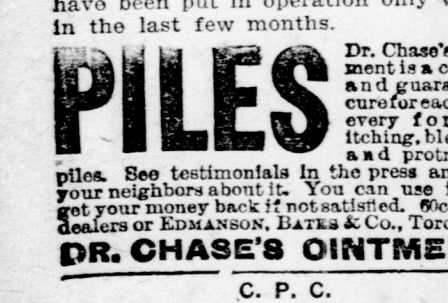
From 75 to 213 miles and two of them have been put in operation only within the last few months.

W. C. T. U. MEETS OFFICERS ELECTED

Mrs. (Rev.) Black Chosen for President—An Appeal for Spectacles.

The annual session of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union was held yesterday in the school room of the First Congregational Church, which had been very kindly loaned to them, as they are at present homeless.

The president, Mrs. McDermid, was in the chair, and there was a very large attendance of members present, some probably attracted by the fact that the election of officers for the ensuing year was on the programme.

The reports from superintendents of departments were then called for, and the recording-secretary's report was the first read, and the members were both surprised and pleased when they heard the summing up of the good deeds accomplished by their union during the year just ended.

Mrs. Y. Miller gave a beautiful address and scripture reading, which were followed by the reports of the thirteen departments.

A Good Work.

In connection with the past year's work of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union it will be remembered by many that during the year ending January last these ladies collected spectacles to send to a missionary in India who found the people among whom she worked so badly-housed, ill-fed and ill-clothed, that while yet young a vast proportion of them became afflicted with blindness. From all sources some 476 pairs of spectacles were gathered and sent to them.

An Appeal.

The secretary of the union says: Surely there are some among our kindly citizens who can find spectacles, perhaps laid away in some half-forgotten corner. Even though these have been reverently garnered because once they were the property of some aged loved one who has gone to the "Land of the Leal" they may with all sweet reverence be donated, for from that home where they "need not the light of the sun," their beloved will rejoice that sight be given to their darkened ones.

Mrs. Thornley, 843 Dundas street, will gladly take charge of any contributions, as indeed will any member of the union living nearby any who desire to give.

Lacking spectacles, perhaps some can spare a stereopticon or even views to use with that sent by some one else. These, the missionary hopes may prove of interest sufficient to open the doors of the Hindoo women's homes. Their portion of the house is bare and very unattractive even when that of the lords and masters are beautifully furnished and rich in objects of interest.

These may be donated and will be taken in charge the same as the spectacles.

The Fee.

A considerable discussion took place over the fee. Mr. Jared Vining and others wanted the fee raised to \$2. The fee now was only \$1, and it was impossible to run the club on the amount of money derived from that source. There should be a membership of 1,000 or 1,200 in a city of this size, but it reached only about one-third of this. The club should have money in the treasury so that it could grant the secretary an honorarium for his services, which were many, and called for a lot of his time.

Capt. T. J. Murphy thought it should be the rule that only members should get tickets unless they were visitors. In the past it was the impression that any person could go and get tickets for a luncheon, and the necessity for membership did not occur to them.

Mr. Gibbons and others opposed the increase, as it would tend to keep away from the club a lot of members. It was the intention to make the club a popular club. The raising of the fee would exclude some. What was wanted was members, not money. He advocated a live membership committee who would make it their business to interest the citizens of London in the club.

The motion to increase the fee was lost.

Mr. W. D. I. Wright was elected chairman of the membership committee. He was given power to name his own committee.

Mr. W. Mills was elected assistant secretary to receive fees.

Short speeches were delivered by Mr. Frank Lawson, vice-president of the club, and others.
