LOCAL MARKET.

There was a good demand for hay to-day, but prices were not as expected, as the quality of the hay was inferior; prices ranged from \$8 to \$10 per ton.

WEEKLY REVIEW.

Although trade at the markets held over the past week was fairly brisk, the prices were not as high as they were the week previous. There should be a good demand for all kinds of farm produce this week, as the Old Boys' celebration will occupy the attention of the citizens next week, and because the market shows that the farmers who do come to the market, from information furnished this paper by the leading farmers of the township adjacent to the city, the crops that have been harvested and those which are yet to be cut, may be summarized as follows: Hay is a little larger crop than last year; oats will likely be fully one-third to one-half more than last season; barley is a good crop, and the sample from the yielding as high as 40 bushels to the acre; corn will be a splendid crop. It is a little too early to predict how the potato crop will turn out, but at the present the plants look healthy.

There will be plenty of early apples, but the late varieties, such as Spies and Bells, will be a very small crop. Plums and pears will be a little above the average. Grapes will be a very heavy crop. Grain—Oats are lower in price than a week ago, and are now selling at \$1.20 to \$1.35 per cwt. Wheat is selling at \$0.90 per cwt. for old and new. Barley would bring \$1.25 per cwt.

Hay and Straw—Hay is in good demand and there is considerable offer; sales are made at \$9 to \$10 per ton. Only a couple of loads of straw offered, which sold at \$7 to \$7.50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—Butter is a scarce commodity at present and prices are higher; sales are made at 22c to 23c for eggs and 24c to 25c for choice rolls. Eggs are in good demand at 15c to 16c per dozen whole.

Potatoes—The demand is fair, and most of the sales are made at 90c to \$1 per bu. Apples—Summer apples are a drug, at 60c to 80c per bu.

The dealers report that poultry is scarce, and quote the following prices: Spring chickens, 10c per lb. alive and 10c dressed; old fowl, 8c per lb. alive and 10c dressed; turkeys, 11c per lb. alive and 12c dressed; ducks sold at 75c to \$1.25 per pair dressed.

Dressed Hogs—The demand is brisk, but not many are offered; sales are made at \$9.50 to \$10 per cwt. small pigs sold at \$4 to \$5.50 per pair.

Live Hogs—The price paid here on Monday was \$6.75 per cwt; small pigs sold at \$4 to \$5.50 per pair.

Butchers' Meats—Trade is rather slow in this line; beef sells at 16c to 18c per cwt; veal, \$1 to \$1.50; lamb, 10c per lb. by the carcass.

Hides are quoted at 7c per lb. for No. 1, 6c for No. 2, and 5c for No. 3 grades of cow hides; calfskins, 3c to 4c per lb. for No. 1, 2c to 3c for No. 2, and 1c to 2c for No. 3.

Wool—8c per lb. for unwashed and 12c for washed.

In the packers' market the hides have ruled particularly firm. Cattle receipts have shown a decrease again, and as both buyers and sellers watch the cattle arrivals as an indication of the immediate future of the market, the packers have used this fact as an argument for a continued maintenance of present strong values.
