The reply says that the £1,000,000 stated to be paid for feathers, the importation of which the act will prohibit, is not the measure of the supply for the English market, because the bulk of the goods are immediately reexported to be worked up on the continent. The wages bill of Great Britain would be, therefore, only very slightly affected. From the official return it would appear that the figures should be £100,000 and not £1, 000,000. There does not seem sufficient ground to justify the fear expressed that the ostrich feather tradewith which the bill does not interfere -would be transferred to foreign countries. 
