DAYTON CELEBRATES
Gala Time in Honor of the Wright Brothers.

Dayton, Ohio, June 17.—Dayton's two-day celebration in honor of the world's champion aviators, Wilbur and Orville Wright, began at 9 a.m. today. At that hour the streets were thronged with people. For ten minutes every whistle, bell and tin horn in the town joined in an outburst of hilarious sound. From every tripartite arches swung out stretched aeroplanes, and on the tops of tall buildings air craft were made to appear ready for flight. Escorted by state militia, troops of regulars and a brass band, the Wrights were driven to a platform before which passed a pageant of representing events from the founding of Dayton 113 years ago down to the present.

Conrad J. Schmidt, president of the local board of trade, thanked the aviators for the fame they had brought the city.

The chief event of the celebration will take place tomorrow, when medals will be presented by the national Government, the State of Ohio and the city of Dayton.

After completing their flights for the Government, which are to begin at Washington next week, both of the Wrights will sail for Germany in August to take up their work there.

An observatory and clubhouse will be erected on the athletic grounds.

THE POINT OF SHIPMENT
U. S. Government and Railroad Clash Over Important Point.

Philadelphia, June 17.—In the indictment yesterday of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway by the federal grand jury, for allowing a lower freight rate than that published in the schedule of the commerce commission, there arises an apt question as to what can be legally recognized as the original point of shipment of commodities and merchandise imported from foreign ports. The proceedings which were started by the Government, constitute a test case of the point at issue.

A carload of beet sugar was imported from Hamburg, Germany, its destination being Alberta, Canada. As no Canadian port was acceptable for the delivery of the sugar, the shipment was sent to the port of Philadelphia, and was handled by the reading part of the way to Alberta.

The Reading charges, it appeared, were but 55 cents per hundred-weight, despite the schedule price of \$1.32, covering this class of freights. The company contends that the shipment was not one which originated in this country, and it does not come within the application of the scheduled rates of the Interstate commerce commission. The original point of shipment, according to the railroad, was in Hamburg, Germany.

United States authorities aver that to all intents and purposes of the act, the carrying of the sugar by the defendant was an original shipment, the starting point being the local port and not Hamburg.

THAW'S MOTHER COLLAPSES
Overcome While Attending Proceedings To Secure Son's Release.

White Plains, N.Y., June 17.—Harry K. Thaw will have to wait in the Matewan Asylum until July 6 for a hearing to determine whether he is sane and in a condition to be released from the asylum. The case came up before Justice Mills here today, on a writ of habeas corpus obtained by Thaw's counsel, Charles Morechauser, wanted to go on with the hearing, but Mr. Clark, a representative of the attorney-general, wanted to have the case transferred to New York city, and District Attorney Jerome, of New York, asked that the hearing be postponed in order to give him an opportunity to attend to other business. Justice Mills decided that the hearing would be held in White Plains.

Thaw's mother, Mrs. William Thaw; his sister, formerly the Countess of Yarmouth; and his two brothers were in the court room. When the justice announced his decision to delay the hearing, Harry's mother collapsed. She shook as though seized with a chill and her daughter called out for a drink of water, saying that her mother was choking. The water revived Mrs. Thaw somewhat, but she was unable to walk without help, and Harry Thaw assisted her to retire to an ante room, and remained there with her for a short time.

NICOLL TELLS SHEARN
HE IS BLACKMAILER
Hot Exchange Between Counsels Engaged in the Gould Divorce Case.

New York, June 18.—The spot-light of the cross-examiner continued to oscillate yesterday in the trial of Mrs. Howard Gould's suit for separation, from the estate at Castle Gould, to St. Regis Hotel, the farm at Blue Gap, Va., the Gould's yacht "Niagara," and back to New York again; but except for those moments when it lingered on Dustin Farnum, it never got very far from the butlers keys to the wine cellar.

There was visibly an attitude on the defence which in this trial of many surprises has been curiously shifted over to what is virtually the prosecution, to prove that Mrs. Gould was not only frequently under the influence of intoxicants as to fall within the rulings of Justice Dowling, that she must be proved an habitual drunkard before her husband can be justified in leaving her, but to prove that, when she had been drinking her character underwent a transformation for the worse.

Delancey Nicoll, counsel for the husband, was willing enough to add testimony that his wife was affable when herself, if only he could bring her good nature into contrast by testimony that tended to show her violent, abusive, uncertain in her motives and confused in her actions at those moments when she was alleged to have been drinking. There was no abatement of her ordeal, and as the burden of iteration grew heavier, she shrank visibly or smiled broadly, or shook her head in amused denial.

Only once was there a break in the procession of footmen, butlers, chauffeurs, maids, waiters and bell boys, on whose testimony it is sought to prove Mrs. Gould an impossible wife; and that was when Mr. Nicoll called Melville E. Chapman, a broker, who was a guest of the Goulds on their yacht during several cruises of the year 1905. Several times, he testified, he had seen Mrs. Gould drunk, and he described also several alleged outbreaks, with emphasis on the overbearing manner of the wife and the efforts of the husband to soothe and conciliate her.

In the effort to discredit this witness, Mr. Shearn drew the ugly word "blackmail" from Mr. Nicoll, and became so much agitated at its application to his own conduct of the case that for some moments he was unable to continue his cross-examination.

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OUT FOR INCOME TAX

United States Democrat Senators Decide to Keep Up the Fight.

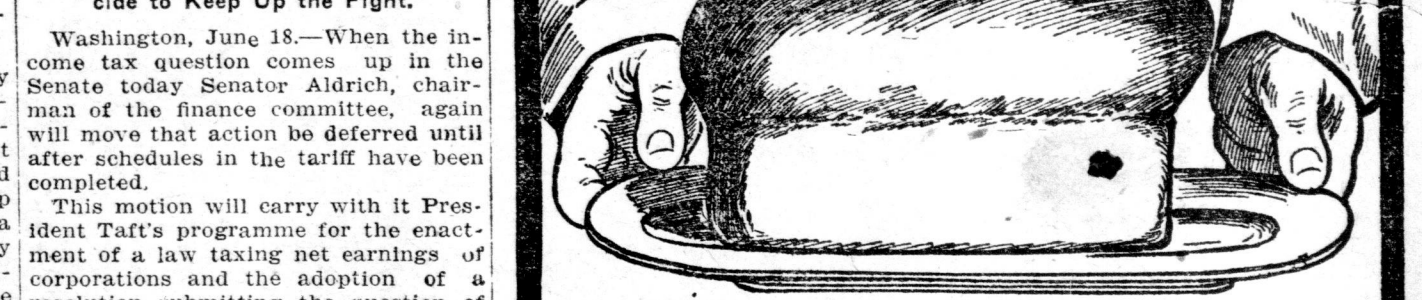
Washington, June 18.—When the income tax question comes up in the Senate today Senator Aldrich, chairman of the finance committee, again will move that action be deferred until after schedules in the tariff have been completed.

This motion will carry with it President Taft's programme for the enactment of a law taxing net earnings of corporations and the adoption of a resolution submitting the question of amending the constitution so as to permit Congress to levy and collect a tax on incomes without regard to apportionment among the states. Mr. Aldrich will make the statement that he believes consideration of schedules may be finished by Monday, and he will suggest that the postponement of the income tax and corporation tax measures be until that time.

At a caucus of the Democrat senators it was decided that the minority shall stand by their previous declaration in favor of the enactment of an income tax law at the present session.

Attorney-General Wickersham showed Senator Aldrich last night the draft of the amendments which President Taft desires to have adopted.
