SEARCH FOR SURVIVORS British Cruisers May Follow Trail of

Wrecked Ship. Victoria, B.C., July 26.—There is a strong probability that the British 32 cruiser Algerine may be dispatched to among the islands for survivors of the Greenock ship Australian, just posted as missing at Lloyds, being hopelessly

15 overdue on a voyage from Mazatlan 28 to Sydney, N. S. W. The vessel left the Mexican port in 26 November and no trace has since 37 been found of her. The owners, Lang 29 and Fulton, of Greenock, have asked 18 the British admiralty to instruct the 20 warships stationed in the Pacific Ocean 23 to make thorough search along the route the Australian would take on

Hopes are entertained that the vessel may have gone ashore on one of the uninhabited islands seldom visited and that the shipwrecked men are still alive, like the crew of the lost British ship Dundonald two years ago, who for many months existed on an islet south of New Zealand, and the crew of the French bark President Felix Faure, who lived many months on an uninhabited island in the Southern Seas, subsisting on flesh of penguins they were rescued by a government

12 they were rescued by a g 37 steamer from New Zealand. The Australian took her crew at Antwerp on September 28, 1907. The 328 captain was James Hunter, of Liverpool; Chief Officer James Wright Lee, Gourock; and Second Officer Duncan Robertson, Glasgow. There were a cook, nine seamen and five apprentices.
