tomed for years to drink pure, healthful spring water, and the people were loath to give it up. It meant so much to the health of the people. The votes of the past have shown us that every scheme with a flavor of river water was unpopular.

"I am glad that the stand I took in January last, supported by the citizens' committee, has met with your approval. We have endeavored to solve the problem in a way different from any ever tried before. We have made tests, and experimented, and we have shown by your confidence in the scheme that you believe these tests have been satisfactory. The work has been done conscientiously, and with a single eye to the interests of the people of this city.

Plenty of Water.
"We have now a great blessing in our midst, an abundant supply of pure spring water, giving us the benefit of green lawns and well-watered streets.

"We feel that the provincial health authorities, notwithstanding the insinuations that have been made against them, have been honest and conscientious in telling us that we have a healthful and pure supply of water. They have been anxious, I am sure, to see that the citizens of London had the best possible supply of water.

"Your vote of today assures us that you have confidence that the project will be carried to a successful conclusion. We will carry out our pledge to the letter. It is no longer a speculation, but an assured fact. All that we need now is to go ahead with the buildings and equipment. I am also certain that we can put in the plant well within the money you have voted.

Successful Wells.
"The wells have turned out more successful than I anticipated in January last, and I am certain that with the supply to be had from the wells, and the fact that we have a million gallons from the wells, we will be able to supply the city until the population reaches 100,000. (Cheers.)

"I desire to thank the citizens' committee and the R. E. O. P. A. for their assistance, but more especially The Advertiser, which has given me such splendid support in enlightening the people of this city on this question.

"We gave the people the facts, and trusted them to give an honest judgment on them.

Desecration of the Drama and History.
To The Editor of The Advertiser:
I think it is time that a protest was made against the pernicious uses to which the moving picture shows are being put. Probably all who are interested in honesty and intelligent education would join in the protest. It might result in bringing about some reform. To start the ball rolling, let me state that on Friday, the 23rd inst., I visited one of the local moving picture shows and was surprised by one of the dramatic pictures. The production was a downright plagiarism of Lord Bulwer Lytton's drama, "The Lady of Lyons." The characters of Claude Melnotte, Pauline and the bluff general, the uncle of Pauline, are such as to be both interesting and educational if properly presented, but when the plot of the drama is murdered by incapables, as was the case in the exhibition in question, no good can result. One would think that the manager of an up-to-date house of public amusement would at least endeavor to give patrons something worthy of producing. Instead of palming off the work of unscrupulous film manufacturers.

If by chance the managers of picture shows are not sufficiently educated to know what is right and proper in dramatic productions, it is the duty of their employers to ask these gentlemen to stop down and make room for better men. It will pay the shareholders in these amusement houses to look after their own interests and they will best do this by keeping in mind the fact that while it is possible to fool the people once, it is exceedingly bad policy to endeavor to fool them all the time. Many characters of history and the drama have been badly portrayed and important historic events have been shockingly misrepresented by these moving picture exhibitions.
