Detroit, Aug. 18.—When Ed. Walsh handed the Tigers a shut-out yesterday, 2 to 0 was the score, thereby knocking them down into third place, he made the tactical mistake of his career. It has been pretty soft this season for the man who worked harder than them all a year ago, and, with the Sox hopelessly out of the flag hunt, it looked like a good fall in which to stall and save one's self. Officially Walsh's arm was not in good condition, and he had pitched but one game since his club left Chicago for the east. In addition to the lameness, he has never been better than intermittent, by far, in the last few days. But there seemed to be nothing the matter with his arm yesterday, and the ancient Detroit hoodoo did not hang over him. In fact, he had the only break in the last few days, the outcome of the game. So it looks like steady work for him from now on.

The Team's Chances.

There never was a chance, the way it was hitting—or not hitting—for the Tigers to win this one, but they might have gone into overtime with a 1 to 1 score, but for one little slip—failure to handle a bunt in the first inning. That started the Sox scoring. With this play made, the best Chicago would have gotten would have been one tally. As Cobb opened the ninth with a double, the chances were good for a run here had it been possible to play for one, instead of necessary to hit for two. But they couldn't hit Walsh. It differed from Tuesday. Then they couldn't hit with men on. Yesterday the men weren't on. There was only one chance to break it up, and then two were out.
