QUEBEC PLANS NO PULP EXPORT DUTY

Province Will Not Make That Retaliation Against the Tariff.

Montreal, Sept. 27.—The report that the Quebec Provincial Government had decided to impose an export duty on all raw wood pulp exported to the United States, is denied by Premier Gouin. Gouin said today that he wished it to be specifically stated that his announcement at St. Johns recently did not mention any export duty and that it was not the intention of the Government to propose any such duty.

D., rector of St. George's Church, and of bachelor of divinity upon Rev. W. C. White, bishop designate of Honan, China. There was a large number of clergy and citizens present at the ceremonies.

His Lordship Judge Colter presided, and the candidates were presented by Principal Waller. Judge Colter conferred the degrees. Rev. Mr. White spoke briefly of the work being done in China and foreign countries by the missionaries of the Christian Church. He thanked the senate for the honor done him, and wished the university prosperity in the future.

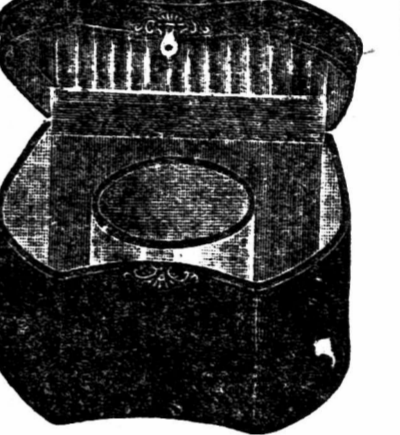

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 27.—Out of the darkness which lay over Lake Erie at Dunkirk early today, darted the tiny schooner T. Vance Straubenstein straight into the course of the steamer City of Erie. There was a crash and shrieks from three persons, who will never call out again—Captain Carson, of Hamilton, Ont., of the sunken schooner; Mate James McCallum, of Toronto, and an unknown woman who cooked for the crew of four.

Mr. Baer entered a specific denial to all the charges contained in the complaint. He denied that a monopoly existed in the anthracite region, denied that the independent operators were forced to accept the 65 per cent basis on which they sell their coal to the coal-carrying roads, and further absolutely denied that there is an attempt at a division of the coal production. "We mine and market coal regardless of what other companies do," he said. He made the interesting statement that with the Reading Railway at the present time the increase of the tonnage of bituminous coal exceeds the increased tonnage of anthracite. Mr. Baer said the individual operators entered into a voluntary agreement with the railroads.

It is now announced that Rizzo made a complete confession to the police at an early hour this morning after an all night session, during which he was given the third degree. 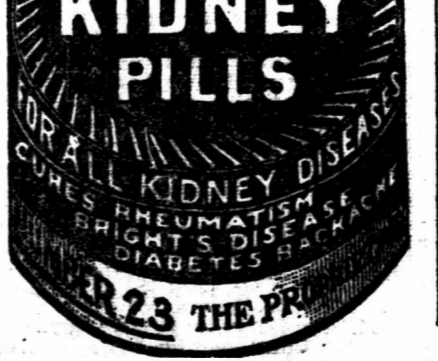

HUNTER'S TRIAL POSTPONED

Lindsay, Sept. 27.—The trial of Joseph Hunter, charged with murdering his wife at the Royal Hotel in Bobcaygeon, on Aug. 7, has been put off until the next assizes. When the case came up today, Mr. E. B. Johnston, for the defence, asked for the postponement, as he required time to get his witnesses together.

The facts of the shooting were admitted, but the defendant was known to be an epileptic, and as witnesses to prove this were widely scattered, a postponement was asked. Crown Prosecutor Blackstock left the matter to the discretion of the court, and Mr. Johnston's request was granted. Dr. Bruce Smith, Government Inspector of Insane Asylums, examined Hunter today, but did not make known the result.
