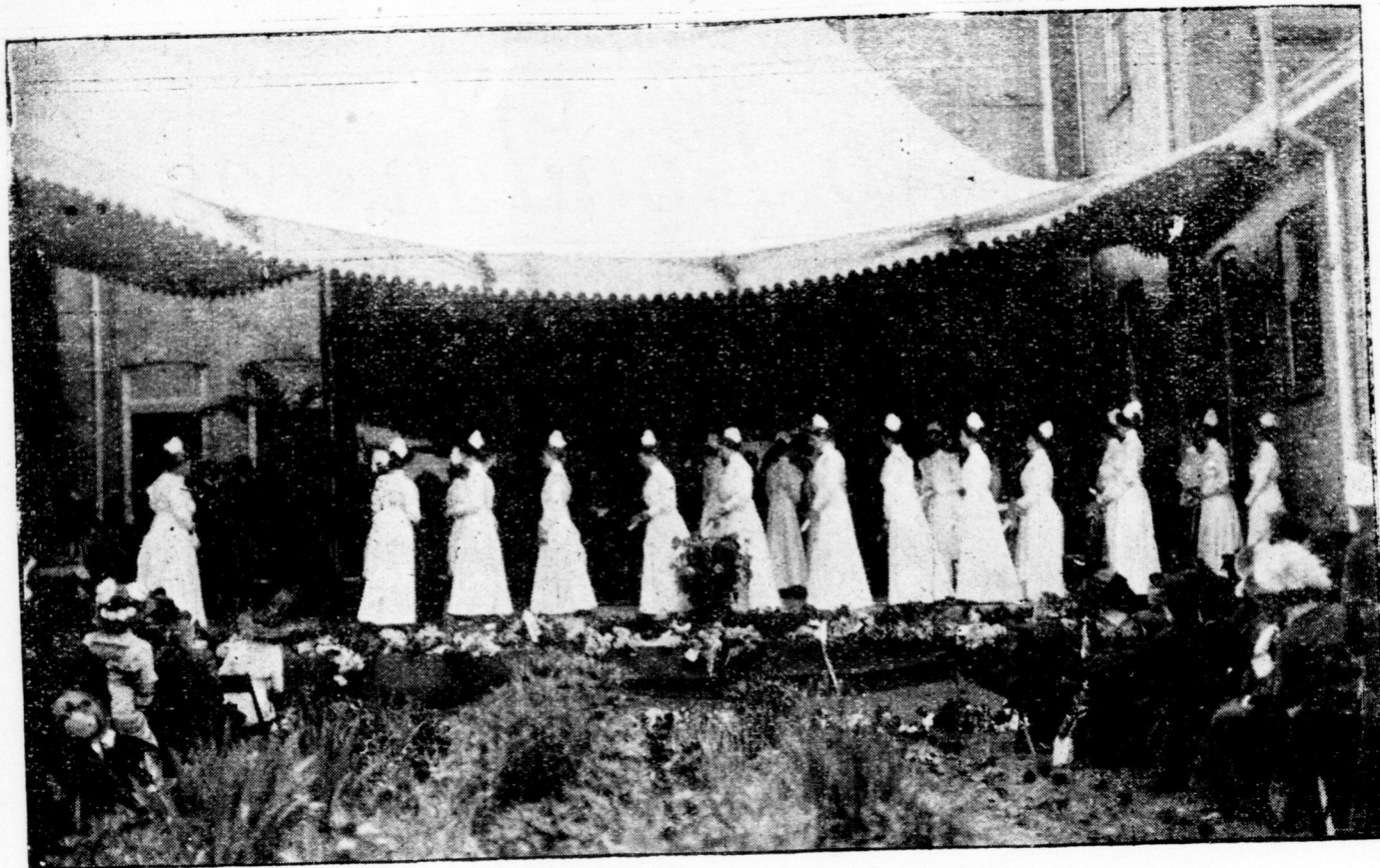

With royalty to present their diplomas, a host of congratulating friends as an audience, the entry of these twenty-six young ladies into their profession was indeed auspicious.



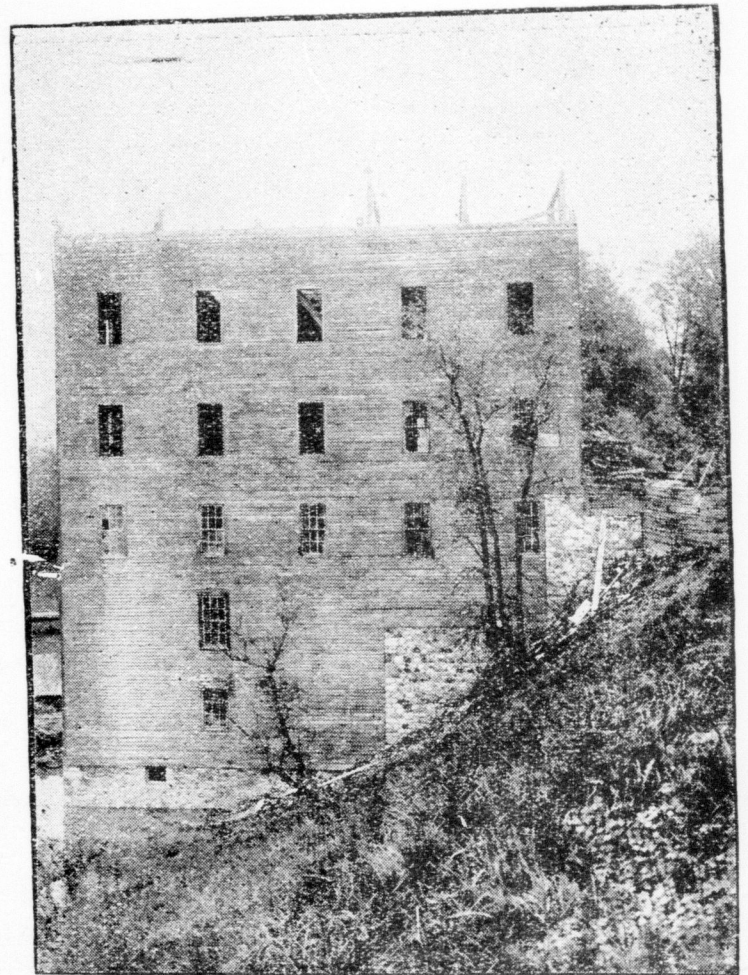

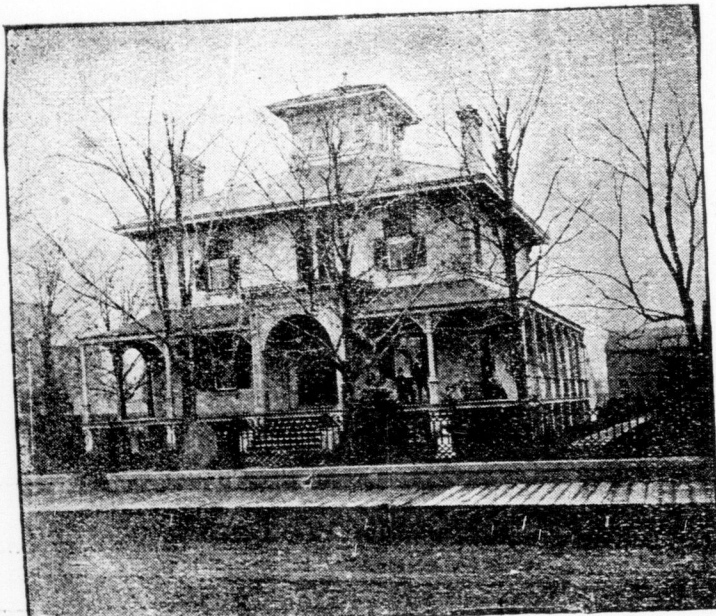

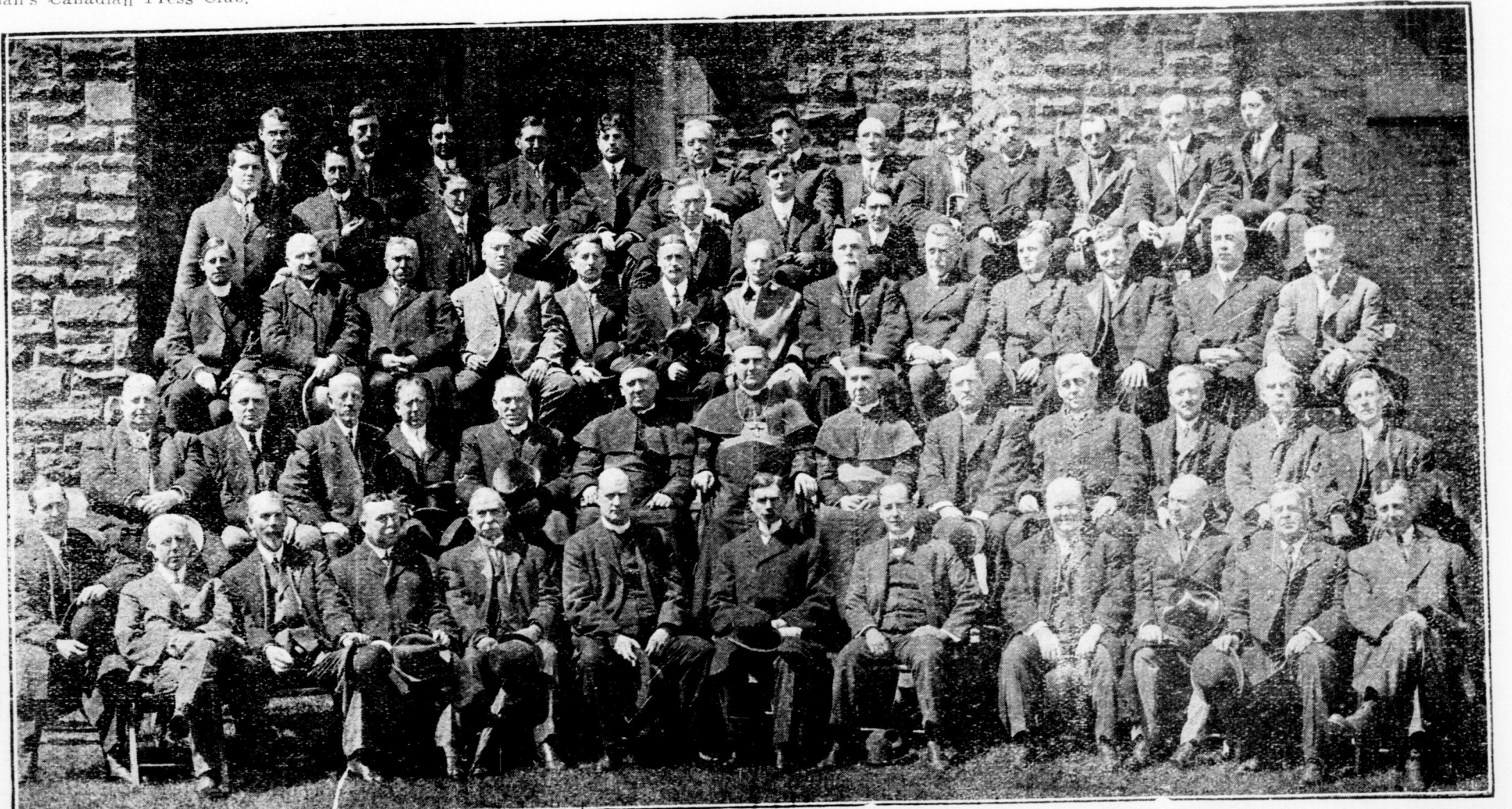
