

PROVINCIAL FEDERATION

Motion To Make the Change Was Rejected By a Decisive Majority.

The annual convention of the Labor Educational Association of Ontario was held at Ottawa last Saturday with about 100 delegates in attendance. The proceedings were opened in Labor Hall at 9 a.m. by President Driscoll, Kingston. Among the delegates were P. M. Draper, Ottawa, and James Watters, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada; J. T. Marks, James Simpson, Thomas Stevenson, Fred Bancroft, Ernest Webb and Thos. Dulan, Toronto; W. Stokes, St. Thomas; Phil. Obermeyer and Albert Waite, Hamilton; W. O. Ruse, London; Charles P. Doughty, Guelph, and many others from all over the Prov-

Provincial Federation. The most important discussion arose over the merging of the association into a provincial federation of labor. This question has been before the annual conventions of the association for several years, and was finally disposed of by the rejection of a motion to make the change offered by James Simpson, of Toronto, by a decisive majority.

It was decided that in future an affiliation fee would be exacted for membership in the association. The figures set by the resolution were: Five dollars for unions and central bodies having a membership under 200, and ten dollars for organizations whose membership totalled over these figures.

President Watters, of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, promised the financial assistance of the congress to the association to defray expenses in connection with the furthering of labor legislation.


