NO PARTY FEELING IN REPEAL DEBATE

Londoner, Who Made Special Trip to Washington, Remarks on Absence of Partisanship.

So interested in the Panama Canal tolls exemption repeal bill was J. A. Cody, 380 Dufferin avenue, this city, that last week he made a special trip to the American capital to hear the debate on the question whether United States coastwise vessels would be exempt from canal tolls. Mr. Cody returned Saturday.

To The Advertiser, this morning, he expressed his pleasure at his trip to Washington. "It was a treat to hear the cream of the American orators discuss the question," he declared. "The debate was marked by an unusual absence of partisanship and the interest taken in it was simply wonderful. Possibly never since the war of the confederacy has there been such an intense interest taken in any measure as in this one."

"What struck me most forcibly was the absence of party feeling. It was an unusual occurrence to see men from the same camp opposing each other so strenuously. Of course the majority of the Democrats lined up behind the repeal, while at the same time many of the Republicans voted for it." Mr. Cody spent sixteen hours in the senate chamber listening to the discussion. During that time the galleries were crowded, there being many there from the various states and from Washington itself that were greatly interested in the question.

BOAT OWNERS OBJECT TO CITY'S TREATMENT

Lack of Action in Remedying Insanitary River Conditions Gives Cause for Grievance.

Motor-boat owners on the river have a grievance. It is the manner in which their complaints of the insanitary condition of the river are ignored by the council.

A heavy, odorous scum that comes down from the north branch, and which the launch owners say is from Hyman's tannery up river, collects at the docks. Sunday the scum accumulated to a depth of fully three inches. It extended out from the piers at least ten feet. When the sun rose the odor rising from the mass was anything but pleasant. Launch owners have gone to the board of control. The matter has been referred to the council. So far as they are aware, nothing has been done. Aside from the inconvenience and unattractiveness connected with the nuisance, boating men say that the acids that are contained in the refuse are eating away the paint on their crafts.

"Aside from our point of view, that accumulation of stuff that comes down the river cannot be conducive to health," said a boat owner. Several years ago the gas company dumped tar-laden water into the river. At that time the south branch was in an awful condition. Finally they were forced to build a catch pool. The water now is poured into the hole. The water percolates through the earth into the river. The tar is cleaned out at regular intervals.

"My idea is that if a boom were swung across the mouth of the creek at the tannery, the scum could be collected there before it gets into the river. It would be a matter of small expense, and would keep the river clear of the filth."

DIFFERENT STORIES OF AUTO ACCIDENT

Witnesses Disagree in Telling of How Policeman Was Injured.

GIRLS ALLEGED VAGRANTS

Port Stanley Lassies Picked Up by Police—Will Go Home.

A confusing array of evidence in the case of John A. Barnard, whose car collided with a motorcycle driven by P. C. Monaghan at Dundas and Richmond streets, May 29, caused Magistrate J. C. Judd to reserve judgment for a week in police court this morning.

Traffic Officer Thomas Noonan, who was on duty at the corner when the accident occurred, swore that Barnard had cut off about twelve feet in turning around him. Noonan had given Barnard the signal to cross. He stated that the driver instead of proceeding on Dundas street and then turning south onto Richmond, cut sharply over a few feet from the traffic officer. As he turned onto Richmond on the "devil's strip" the accident occurred.

Riding in the car with Barnard were his wife and son. They stated that signals had been correctly exchanged, and that their car took the proper course. Other witnesses summoned told conflicting stories on the position of the car after the accident. Monaghan, the injured officer, was not certain as to what part of the car had struck him.
