

TEN KILLED BY BIG EXPLOSION IN C. P. R. WORK CAMP

Premature Blast Blew Many
Station Workmen to Pieces
Near Kingston.

Consul General Takes Matter
Up As Accidents Occur
Too Frequently.

Kingston, June 26.—Ten were killed in the premature explosion of dynamite at Echo Lake camp, about 11 miles west of Parham, on the C. P. R. construction, early this morning. Six bodies have been recovered and the others are buried in the debris. It is not known just how the accident occurred, but it is thought that it was through carelessness on the part of some of the men handling the explosives. The men were working during the night in an endeavor to catch up with the work following the grading having overtaken them. The blast was set in with the intention of exploding it this morning.

Buried in Debris.
The accident occurred in a cut through a large section of rock and the bodies were buried under tons of debris. Men are at work clearing away the rock, and it was thought that all the bodies would be recovered before tomorrow. Among the number killed is the gang foreman, Mike Guterrey, an Italian, who had charge of one section of the construction. His body was found several hundred feet from where the explosion occurred. The body was mutilated almost beyond identification. Several other bodies were also found a distance from the explosion.

Second Accident.
This is the second accident which has occurred on the C. P. R. construction of this line. A couple of months ago two men were killed in an explosion near Christy Lake camp. Altogether there have been about twenty men killed in this neighborhood. About a year ago an explosion occurred on the C. N. R. construction near Stone's Corner, in which eight men were killed, and several died subsequently from injuries sustained. The situation is such that the Italian consul-general has taken up the matter, and has issued notice that before an inquest is held into any further accidents of this nature in this vicinity in which Italians are the victims, the consul in Toronto must be notified. This firm has been engaged by the consul to look after the interests of Italians engaged in construction work.

MR. COWAN DIES AT HIS DESK; VICTIM OF EXTREME HEAT

City Shocked by Sudden Demise
of Local Master of
High Court.

Was a Native of London, and
Long Prominent in Public
Affairs.

Affected by the extreme heat of the day, R. K. Cowan, local master in chancery and of the high court, dropped dead at his desk in the county buildings, Ridout street, last Thursday afternoon. A brain affection, caused by the heat, was given as the cause of death. At six o'clock Mr. Cowan and his stenographer, Miss Ida K. Lindsay, were finishing the day's work. Almost without warning the local master toppled and fell. A physician, who was summoned immediately declared death to be instantaneous.

Two years ago Mr. Cowan was stricken with a paralytic stroke, and his condition was for some time precarious. He, however, made a complete recovery, and had been in unusually good health during the past summer.

Mrs. Cowan Absent.
His widow, Mrs. Cowan, was cruising with a party in J. C. Duffield's yacht, the Bethama, when the sudden death occurred.

Mr. Cowan was born 53 years ago in this city, the son of the late James Cowan, founder of the Cowan Hardware Company. His early education was in the old union school. It was completed at Tassie College, Galt. Upon the completion of his course there he was articled as a law student to the late Warren Rock. Before his term was completed, however, the firm dissolved and he was re-articled with Edmund Mercer.

Ten years ago he was appointed master in chancery and deputy registrar of the high court, succeeding the late Colonel Shanley. In addition to his important legal office, Mr. Cowan was prominent in fraternal circles. He was past grand master of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, solicitor-general of the same order, and was high up in the Royal Arcanum and Canadian Order of Oddfellows.

Besides his widow, five brothers, David J. and Harper, of this city; Thomas and Dr. Charles, of Seattle, and John, of Vancouver; and two sisters, Mrs. A. O. Hunt, of this city, and Mrs. Ross Gillespie, of Vancouver, survive.

The funeral will be private on Saturday morning.

BIG PROMOTION FOR C. BROWN

A Former London Resident
Engineer Named Head of
Federal Lines.

HAS WIDE EXPERIENCE

Montreal, June 26.—The appointment is announced of Collinswood B. Brown to the position of chief engineer of the Government railways in Canada. Since graduating in civil engineering at Cornell 14 years ago, Mr. Brown has been in the employ of the Canadian Pacific Railway, filling various engineering positions, from roadman to principal assistant engineer, a post to which he was appointed two years ago, and which he now resigns to become head of the Government railways engineering department.

Mr. Brown is very well known both in Eastern and Western Canada, having been in turn resident engineer at London, Ont., assistant division engineer at Calgary, division engineer at St. John and Montreal before becoming chief assistant of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Although a graduate of an American college, Mr. Brown is a Canadian. He was born at Kingston thirty-six years ago, and is thus a comparatively young man. Later he resided with his parents at Oshtemo and Ithaca, where he took his college course.

The management of the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island Railways feel they have secured a particularly able and experienced man, who will take up his residence at Montreal on the 1st of July.

HEALTH OF CANADA AT HIGH STANDARD SAYS DR. M'MURCHY

Tells of Ways by Which the
National Health May Be
Conserved.

Makes Strong Plea for the
Babies, Thousands of Whom
Are Neglected.

"National Health" was the subject of a most interesting and instructive lecture by Dr. Helen M'Murphy in Wesley Hall Thursday evening. A large audience heard her discuss the problems presented by the physically unfit of a nation in a frank and fearless fashion. Her lecture was illustrated by a splendid series of lantern slides, depicting conditions in many Canadian cities, and her remarks constituted quite an education in ways and means of conserving the nation's health.

Dr. H. H. Hill, director of the Institute of Public Health, presided at the meeting, and in his opening remarks made mention of the fact that the medical profession had not been slow in recognizing the value of women in its ranks. In that respect, he said, the medical convention now meeting in the city, differed somewhat from others previously held here.

National Health.
There is a high standard of national health in Canada at present, declared Dr. M'Murphy. This fact was attested by the protest of a number of English doctors recently who, in the course of their visit to this country, were not physically fit. It was not to be expected, they said, that they should equal the native-born Canadians in physique. How to maintain the high standard was the problem at present facing the nation. The observation of a few simple rules was all that was required, she said.

Fresh air, good food, a good supply of sleep, and a regular exercise of a nation, without those essentials, national health was impossible.

Progress in Sanitation.
Dr. M'Murphy cited many instances to show the progress made by the medical profession in matters of sanitation. England had led in this respect, and had practically taught the world sanitation. The death rate in England was 19 in a thousand, and in 1910 it had dropped to 14.

The Panama Canal had been made possible only by the doctor's France, and the project and failed, not because the engineers were inferior to the Americans, but because the fever had stricken the laborers. Sanitation had practically wiped out fever in the world. In the Royal Canadian Mounted Police hospital in Ontario in 1911, of these 690 died of typhoid, 1,600 of cancer, 1,800 by accident, of which 39 were suicides, and 200 of drowning accidents. The deaths by drowning were appalling, she said, in that the vast majority of them were preventable.

Plea for the Babies.
Dr. M'Murphy made a strong plea for the babies, thousands of whom, she stated, died annually from lack of proper care.

She touched briefly on the death toll exacted by tuberculosis, 2,500 dying annually from this cause. She also spoke at some length on the subject of the care of the feeble-minded. The Province of Ontario had a large number of them, and she urged that they be taken care of by the state. They should not be allowed to marry and bring into the world others similarly afflicted. She advised the membership to subscribe to the work of the Y. M. C. A., which is doing a magnificent work in looking after the immigrants.

Dr. M'Murphy was tendered a hearty vote of thanks at the close of her lecture. Later in the evening the medical men of this city entertained their visiting colleagues at a smoker in the basement of the Masonic Temple. Mr. Thomas Logan acted as master of a splendid program, which was thoroughly enjoyed. It included numbers by Mr. Alfred Dunn, Bert Ferrie, the Jones children, and the "Cousins" Quartet. Refreshments were served during the entertainment.

A symposium on diseases of the thyroid occupied the attention of the doctors at the afternoon session. The discussion was opened by an able paper by Dr. Ochsner, of Chicago. By a splendid series of lantern slides he showed what symptoms might be looked for in patients suffering from this disease, and also illustrated in detail the operation for removing a portion of the thyroid gland. A number of papers of technical character were read by other physicians dealing with the same subject in both its medical and surgical aspects.

TORONTO, June 27.—United Stockyards.—The run here yesterday totaled 77 cars, with 651 cattle, 377 calves, 2,935 hogs and 1,270 sheep. Despite the fact that the cattle market has been very slow all week, today's shipment was one of the largest closing-day shipments of the month. Consequently the market became weaker, and much good stock was disposed of at sacrifice prices. Choice export and choice butcher cattle, however, remained practically firm with yesterday. During the hot weather the demand for meat is far below the average, and cattle dealers are finding the market a very slow sale. Large shipments and an overabundance of grass-fed cattle are all tending to keep the market weak. Sheep also took another drop, light ewes going from 25c to 30c below yesterday's quotations. Spring lambs, however, remained firm, and were a fair trade. The calf market is the only one which has failed to show a decline, having remained firm for the past two weeks. A review of the week shows an opening market, that predicted a very good trade. Various things combined to cause the decline of the sheep market, but the outlook for next week predicts a picking up, if not a full recovery, of the opening quotations. The condition of next week's cattle market will depend wholly upon the producer. Sheep shipments will cause a further decline, as will continued dry weather. Hogs opened this week at 35c below last week's prices. The market remained firm all week, increasing 10c per cwt. towards the close. Next week's offerings will be 25c lower than today's closing. Choice butcher cattle sold from \$5.50 to \$6.50, medium from \$5.25 to \$8.10, and common from \$4.75 to \$5.75. Butcher bulls ranged from \$3 to \$8, canners and cutters from \$2 to \$2.50, and milkers and springers from \$1.50 to \$7.50, according to quality. Good feeding hogs sold from \$5.75 to \$8.10, heavy feeding hogs from \$5.75 to \$8.10, and good common from \$5.50 to \$8.10. Lambs sold from \$5 to \$9, ewes from \$3.75 to \$4.50, and bucks from \$3.75 to \$4.50.
