Ralph B. Britton Was Beaten by Friedo After Fouling the First Buoy.

Brooklyn, N. Y., July 11. - Ralph B. Britton, Gananoque Canoe and Motorboat Club, lost the first international race for the canoe challenge trophy here this afternoon. Britton was not only beaten by Leo Friede, defender of the cup, but also was disqualified for fouling a mark. disqualification was not announced until after the contest had been decided although Britton reported the foul \$5,000, 2 in 3 at the end of the first round.

New York, July 12. - More than a oillion eggs are on ice according to the report of 45 public refrigerators of the United States just issued. The figures ccount for 2,992,800 cases in storage with thirty dozen eggs to the case, as compared with 3,330.500 cases at the same time last year.
