

John Hancock—"Father of the Revolution"

PON the Declaration of Independence his name may be read without spectacles. His signature was the first subscribed to the world's most famous State document. In the most realistic sense John Hancock pledged his life and his fortune to the cause of the Revolution. He was one of the richest men in the colonies, holding investments in banks, breweries, stores, hotels, and also owning a fleet of vessels. He would have frowned upon any legislation which would restrict the natural rights of man, and would have voted NO to prohibition enactments.
