

AMERICANS CAPTURE FAMOUS PARIS CAFE

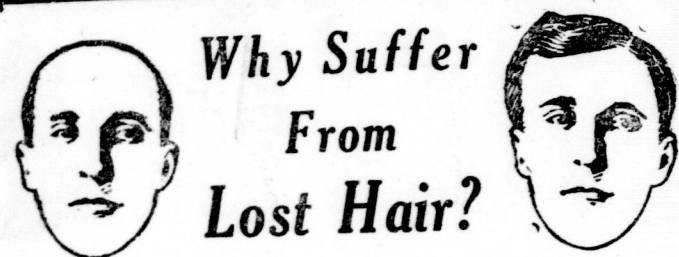
PARIS, Sept. 13.—Just as the early Dutch settlers succeeded in driving the whiskey-loving redmen from the Manhattan Island wigwags, the artistic element of the American colony here, flanked by a host of idlers, have succeeded in capturing the gayest what formerly was one of the gayest sections of the Paris Latin quarter. Before the war the outer zone of this section was marked by the cafes De la Rotonde and Du Dome, which are only a stone's throw from the Gare Montparnasse.

Frequenters of the district originally came from the "Boul Miché" and adjacent streets, and then the student life of the Sorbonne found interest there, but this interest was confined chiefly to artists and sculptors. Then the fame of the place spread, with the result that when American artists found the quarter they decided that nothing was better than the Rotonde. In a little while hundreds of Americans, all of them thirsty, and some with money to pay for drinks, began going there every night. They continue this, and gather there at small tables, trying meanwhile to get some inspiration from the artists of the last century. Occasionally a long-haired, impetuous wood-etcher and students from the Danish art colony come around,

FRENCH DEMAND SOVIET EXODUS FROM RUSSIA

Condition To Rescuing Country From Plight.

TERRIBLE CONDITIONS

Authors of Frightful Catalogism Must Be Thrown Out.

10,000 STILLS ARE BUSY AT SAN JUAN

San Juan, P.R., Sept. 13.—There are 10,000 stills in operation in the island, in violation of the Volstead act and local laws, in the opinion of the prohibition director's staff. This opinion is substantiated by a recent statement of Antonio R. Barcelo, president of the senate, who holds that so long as light times and sentences are imposed, rum-making in the island cannot be suppressed.

Paris, Sept. 13.—There is a growing demand in France that the famine relief to Russia be accompanied by the exodus of Bolsheviks from power. Whether as preliminary conditions, or whether as attendant circumstance, or whether as ultimate result, is not considered so important, but the French believe Russia is suffering much less from drought than from the Soviets and that other nations owe it to Russia and to themselves to see that Russia is not in the same plight again next year. And they believe that Russia's sorry condition can best be remedied by removing the causes—namely, Lenin and Trotsky.

Communist circles in France say the bourgeois officials are trying to make a change in their Government the price to starving Russians of a piece of bread. That is unfair. French statesmen have for two years consistently fought the Soviets, first by arms and then by diplomacy. They have always held that the Soviet regime would bring to sorrow any country that embraced it. That belief has been back of the rigid suppression of Bolshevism in France and of their effort to discourage it in Russia. The supreme council will consider saying that compassion for the starving Russians will be accompanied by consideration of whether the means are offered to end the activities of the rule of Moscow. For the past two or three days French newspapers have been publishing voluminous stories of the horrors of the Bolshevik regime beside the most recent reports of famine and cholera. More than that, a good many editors have come right out and say that it is perfectly all right for other nations to tax themselves to feed the starving Russians, but that they might as well make a complete job of it and remove the fountain head of Russia's sorrow.

The Echo de Paris today, praising Hoover's project to save Russian babies and women, says that it is only just to call attention to Trotsky's recent orders for raising fresh regiments for the "approaching war," and declares that Hoover should be on his guard against strengthening the Red army.

La Liberté reviews the fine promises of the Bolsheviks, and says: "Look at the result—transport disorganized, the old Tsarist bureaucracy replaced by new ones more numerous and more venal, the farmers, robbed and persecuted, cease to cultivate except for their own needs, and millions starve."

Now Europe and America are called to the need of a country which used to be a big exporter of grain. Hoover is a man to meet this need. He is not a man to let himself be duped by the Soviets. He has imposed his conditions as the supreme council will impose its conditions.

What is most important is that the authors of this frightful catalogism be thrown out. Their failure is such that they must at once give way to others. It is announced that they are consenting to take men of other parties into their councils. That is not enough. They must get out entirely. The Temps tonight publishes three columns of a horror story telling of conditions in Russia from an eyewitness. The Journal des Debats, after a similar article takes the Russians to task. "Russia is not suffering from drought, it is suffering from Bolshevism," and whatever sympathy is inspired by the plight of hundreds of thousands of a nation, we do not hesitate to say that a nation of more than a hundred millions which submits to the tyranny of several hundred assassins and profiteers, a people whose soldiers abandoned their allies that such people have in some degree deserved their fate. We have the right, before imposing on ourselves sacrifices to save them, to lay down certain conditions.

These conditions are, of course, that the Russians overturn the Soviets. The Gauls says Lenin and Trotsky are now in the presence of the fruits of their labors. "And now Lenin and Trotsky are wondering if the faculty of their Asiatic guard will assure them the last piece of bread in Russia," it says. "They have accepted the conditions of Mr. Hoover, and they will accept any conditions which permit them to hold on to their misused power, with which they have thrown Russia into an abyss." The Gauls says it is childish to blame the Russians for famine and drought, because Russia always had periodic droughts, but under an efficient government the supplies of other sections helped out the stricken portion. Russia's troubles are due simply to her Soviet Government. The Gauls says Ambassador Herrick of America and Ambassador Lord Hardinge of England have discussed with the French Government ways and means of aiding starving Russians. Not only may grain be had from America, but from Bulgaria, Hungary, Rumania, India, Indo-China and China have available supplies if they can be transported.

TOWNS AND CITIES WANT MORE TAXES

British Columbia Municipalities Are Making Demands.

Victoria, Sept. 13.—When the Union of British Columbia Municipalities meets this week in Port Alberni in annual convention another strenuous effort will probably be made to force the contentions of the municipalities regarding taxation and finance upon the Provincial Government.

The municipalities have been fighting for years for increased income and have repeatedly made representations to the Government for additional revenue sources. They claim that the provincial treasury now receives taxes from many quarters that should properly go towards paying the debts of the municipalities, and in this category are placed amusement, motor, insurance and various forms of income tax, all of which the province now absorbs.

Premier Oliver has announced a special session of the Legislature this fall. This will probably commence in October or November, and it may take the place of the customary spring sitting. The premier has promised to have introduced during this session legislation that will assist the municipalities, and in the meantime the cities and other organized districts of the province are planning to submit their strongest arguments for relief. Several different proposals have been made, and at this time it is uncertain what plan the union will concentrate upon or in what direction the province's action will take.

Veteran of Canadian Army Will Command Foreign Legion

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Commanded by a veteran of three wars, who won his way from buck private to the rank of major while serving with the Canadian army in France, three hundred men left here today for Spain on the S.S. Australia Lopez to fight the Moors in Morocco. The foreign legion is made up of men who speak half a dozen tongues, but the majority have records of service in the world war. Men who served under Pershing and Byng share quarters on the ship with men who served under Carranza and Villa, and among the latter are men who were officers of rank.

Captain Donald McGregor is the officer in command. Born in India, he became a lieutenant in the Royal Indian army. In the South African campaign he was a captain and when the world war broke out he enlisted in Canada as a private, but came out with the rank of temporary major and several decorations.

In the party are about sixty from the United States and thirty from Canada. Many of the Canadian and United States men were non-commissioned officers during the world war.

TELLS HOW U-BOAT DROWNED 35 SAILORS

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The story of thirty-five British sailors being put on the deck of a German submarine, which was then deliberately submerged and the men left to drown, was told recently at Bow street police court by Captain Starkey of the British steamer Torrington.

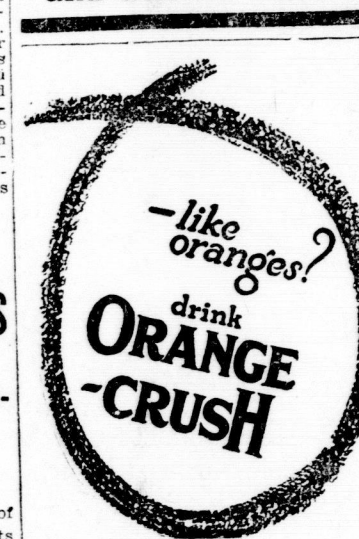
The Bow street proceedings were in connection with the war crime charge of murder against Captain Wilhelm Werner, commander of U-boat 55, who has not been arrested by the German authorities.

The incident happened April 8, 1917, about 150 miles off the Scilly Islands. Starkey is the sole survivor of those aboard the Torrington, for, after he and the crew had been ordered on to the deck of the submarine, he was taken below to be questioned. To this fact he owed his life.

Starkey told how Werner had called him a pirate who deserved to be shot. "As for the others, the German commander added, 'let them swim.'"

At this time thirty-five of the Torrington's crew were on the U-boat's deck and the remainder were in one of the ship's lifeboats. German sailors went off to this boat and brought back meat and rum. None of the men in that boat were ever heard of again.

ASSOCIATED WITH MEMORY OF GOLDEN DUSTMAN.

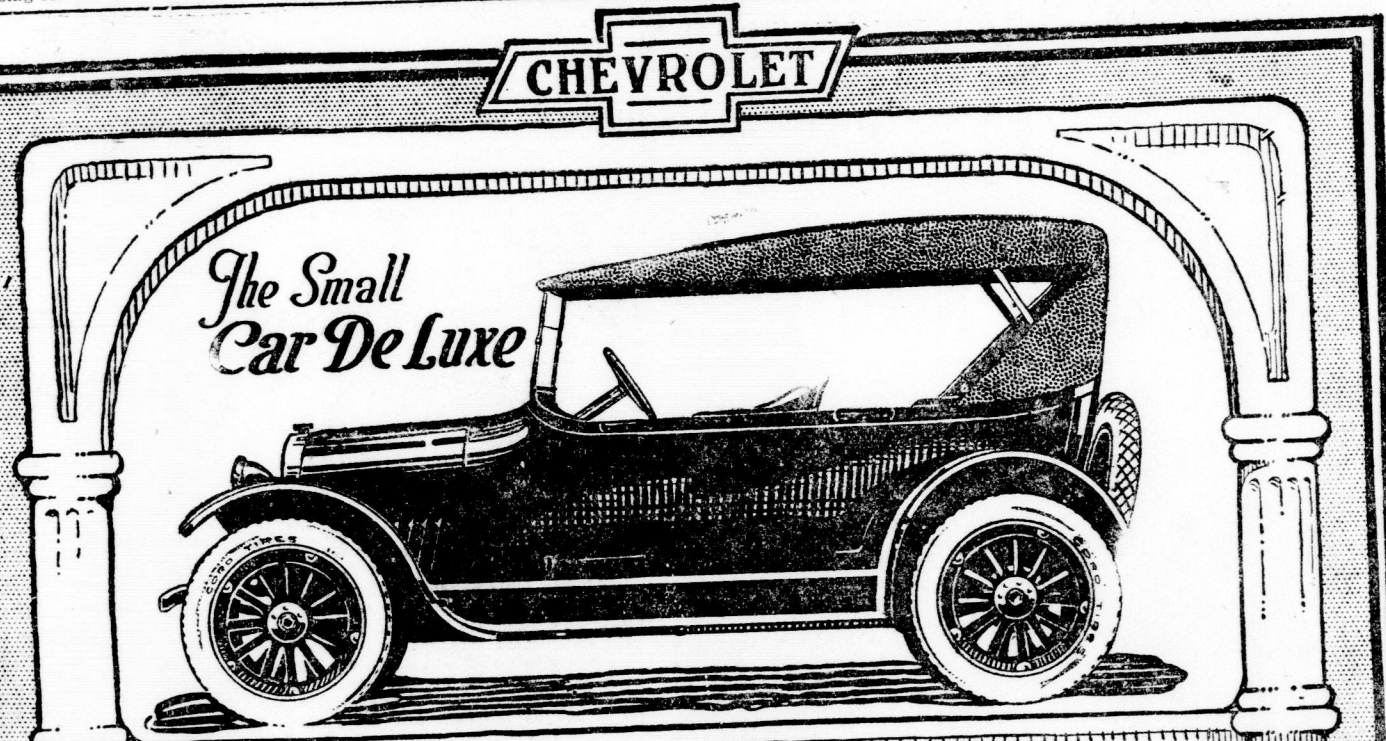
