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SUSTAIN DRURY GOVERNMENT IN BUDGET VOTE

Amendment by Dewar Is De-
 feated by Showing of 42
 to 29.

HAY SCORES POLICY

Liberal Leader Claims On-
 tario Administration Spend-
 ing Funds Unwisely.

TORONTO, May 2.—After six
 weeks of intermittent discussion the
 budget debate wound up in the On-
 tario Legislature tonight. Commencing
 shortly before 4 o'clock in the
 afternoon the three leaders held forth
 until a few minutes after 10 o'clock
 at night, when Premier Drury con-
 cluded.

The amendment of H. H. Dewar,
 K.C., condemning the government's
 expenditure for sundry purposes, of
 borrowings under the hydro act was
 then defeated by a vote of 42 to 29.

In the vote on the Dewar amend-
 ment the government forces voted
 solidly against. From the opposition
 benches the government had the sup-
 port of the issue of Sam Clarke, Lib-
 eral member for Northumberland; J.
 W. Curry, K.C., Liberal member for
 Southeast Toronto, and John Joynt,
 Conservative member for North
 Huron.

All three leaders made commend-
 able contributions to the financial
 discussions. Mr. Hay, who was first
 on the floor, made his best effort
 of the session, and, incidentally,
 went further in the way of govern-
 ment criticism than he had hereto-
 fore gone.

Hon. G. H. Ferguson, Conservative
 leader, made a characteristic vigor-
 ously critical deliverance on govern-
 ment accounting. O. T. A. adminis-
 tration, highway expenditures and so
 forth.

Claims \$200,000 Saving.
 Premier Drury, who wound up the
 debate with a comprehensive "birds-
 eye view" of provincial finances, thrust
 aside the capital versus ordin-
 ary expenditures controversy as "old
 stuff" and pointed out, after process
 of elimination, that, excluding in-
 creased expenditures on education
 and public institutions, which no one,
 he said, had criticized, the govern-
 ment had actually economized to the
 extent of over \$200,000, in comparison
 with the expenditures of the late
 Conservative government.

Wellington Hay, leader of the
 Liberal group, took exception to the
 claims frequently made that there
 is too much time taken up in the
 Legislature in dealing with matters
 which come before it. He pointed
 out that the same speed was not
 possible with four different groups
 in the Legislature as in the old
 days under the two-party system.

Favors Hydro Radicals.
 The Liberal leader emphasized that
 his party was for hydro radicals, and
 looked forward to the day when all
 the feeders and suburban railways
 in the province would be run by
 electricity. They might not all be
 operated by the province, but they
 would be nationally owned.

Hydro radicals are coming, he said,
 and he did not think the government
 had needed to spend \$400,000 on a
 commission to find out whether they
 were feasible or not. He denied that
 the government had saved anything
 for the communities behind radicals,
 when it tied up the projects as it
 had done. He urged the government
 to deal generously with these com-
 munities.

The Liberal leader's most pointed
 criticism of the government was in
 regard to the practice of borrowing
 money under the hydro electric act
 without a vote of parliament and
 using it for other purposes. He said
 that the Liberal principle, the one
 on which it had always stood, is
 that any money spent by depart-
 ments of the government must be
 voted by the house.

He pointed to large expenditures on highways
 which had not been voted by the assembly.
 "Never again," he said, "will this
 province come to its own until it
 returns a Liberal administration to
 insist upon such system of respon-
 sible government."

Questions Legislation.
 He questioned the advisability of
 a government "so bent on moraliz-
 ing the people by legislation, sharing
 in the profits of race track gam-
 bling."

Mr. Hay warned the government
 that he thought the limits of tax-
 ation had been reached and he esti-
 mated that the next five or ten years
 would be the most difficult for the
 province in the matter of taxation,
 so that the ministry should use great
 care.

He thought the provincial treasur-
 er had used poor judgment in issuing
 such long term loans as twenty and
 twenty-two years at six per cent.
 He argued that they should have
 been short term loans while the
 rates of interest were so high.

The great increase in the public
 expenditures since the Liberal gov-
 ernment was in power in 1914 was
 stressed by Mr. Hay. He questioned
 many items placed in capital or ex-
 traordinary account which he
 thought ought to have been in ordi-
 nary expenditure, and with this
 change instead of having a surplus
 the provincial treasurer would have
 had to report a deficit of about \$5,-
 000,000. He asked if the auditor had
 passed this.

Stevenson Would Aid Phone Companies.

TORONTO, May 2.—Dr. H. A.
 Stevenson of London, Ont.,
 urged in the Legislature today
 that the government grant as-
 sistance to rural telephone com-
 panies who suffered heavily by
 the storms of the last few
 months in Western Ontario. He
 said that in one district alone
 140 miles of wire was down,
 and gave other examples of the
 seriousness of the blow suffer-
 ed by these companies.

C. F. Swayze of Niagara Falls
 complained that a Winnipeg
 firm who had the contract for
 completing the intake pipe at
 Niagara was offering only 25
 cents an hour to common
 laborers, and 50 cents an hour
 for skilled men.

"The auditor has submitted his

Mr. Ferguson asked if the auditor
 passed on whether certain items
 should be placed in the capital or
 ordinary expenditure.

"No," replied Mr. Smith.

"Yes, like a good hired man," said
 Mr. Smith.

Wants Old-Time System.

Mr. Hay concluded by urging that
 the province did not want the policy
 of a government seeking to avoid re-
 sponsibility. It wants the old-time
 party system where the minister was
 held responsible to the house and to
 the public for the conduct of the de-
 partment. That was true responsible
 government.

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Con-
 servative leader, said Mr. Hay had
 come out four-square for Liberal
 principles of responsible government
 and had ceased to flirt with the party
 across the aisle. His speech today
 would be received with happiness by
 the Liberals of the province, and, in
 fact, by the Conservatives as well.

Referring to Hon. Peter Smith's
 statement that the "deficit" as fig-
 ured out by W. F. Nickle, Conserva-
 tive, of Kingston, and that figured
 by Charles McCrea, Sudbury, did not
 agree, the Conservative leader said
 that Mr. McCrea's figures were after
 a hurried perusal of the public ac-
 counts, while Mr. Nickle went thor-
 oughly into it and found more in-
 stances where items which should
 have been charged to current ex-
 penditure were charged to capital ex-
 penditure, which accounted for said
 Nickle showing a greater "deficit"
 than had Mr. McCrea.

The Conservative leader said that
 the provincial treasurer had admitted
 to the house that moneys received
 by him from current revenue up to
 December 8, totalling over \$2,000,000,
 had been put into the accounts of
 last year, although the books should
 close on October 31. On the other
 hand, some \$4,000,000 worth of ac-
 counts paid out within the next two
 weeks after October 31, were put over
 into next year's accounts. "You
 ceased to pay the debts of the pro-
 vince sharply on October 31, but you
 took all the money that came in from
 current revenue up to December 8,
 in order to get a surplus."

Mr. Smith said that this had al-
 ways been the practice, and Mr.
 Ferguson denied this, asking specifi-
 cally if Hon. Mr. McNery, when
 provincial treasurer, had put into a
 year's receipts money received after
 the date for closing the books.

Scores Smith's Statement.

"Yes," Mr. Smith answered.
 "I took precaution to ask Mr. Mc-
 Garry about that today, and he said
 it was never done while he was
 treasurer," Mr. Ferguson replied.

The incident ended by both agree-
 ing to throw it out in the public
 accounts committee.

Mr. Ferguson went on to say that
 the provincial secretary had admitted
 a \$5,000,000 error in the public ac-
 counts, which would never have been
 known about had Mr. Nickle not dis-
 covered it. This, he argued, was a
 reflection on the efficiency of the
 staff of the provincial treasurer.
 Among the items which he claimed
 were charged to capital expenditure
 was \$800,000 interest, \$350,000 for
 the commission investigating the hydro
 radicals, mothers' allowance expendi-
 tures, and also to unemployment.
 In moving adjournment for dinner,
 he said it was a serious thing when
 the provincial treasurer would refer
 to the provincial auditor as a "hired
 man." "Certainly the province will
 view with alarm such an attitude. I
 will just leave it at that."

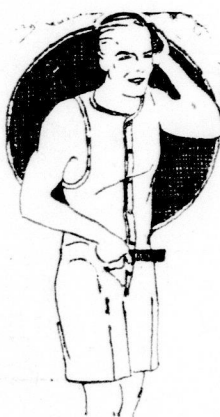

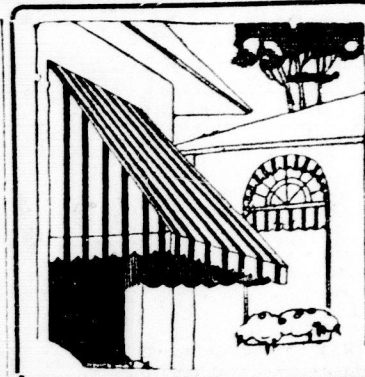
