WILL DISCUSS PLAN TO MAKE WORLD "DRY"

Prohibition Leaders of Fifty
Nations To Meet At
Toronto.

FAMOUS MEN TO ATTEND

Toronto, Nov. 19.—(By Canadian Press).—The "dry" forces of the world will invade Toronto this week, when the first international convention of the World League Against Alcoholism will be held in Massey Hall here, combined with the conventions of the Ontario and Dominion Alliance. The conventions will open November 23, and will continue until November 29. The first day will be devoted to the Ontario and Dominion Alliance meetings, then follow the World League sessions.

It is expected that the World League convention will be attended by representatives from more than fifty nations, including those of Europe, India, Australia, the Orient, Africa, South America, Egypt and the West Indies.

The convention will be open to all those in sympathy with the world-wide prohibition movement. Men of international repute will address the gatherings, which doubtless will more than fill Massey Hall at all the sessions of the World League convention. There are three joint presidents of the World League Against Alcoholism—Dr. Robert H. Jackson of Lausanne, Switzerland; Right Hon. Lief Jones of York, England, and Dr. Howard H. Russell of Westerville, Ohio.

A large number of prominent women leaders will address the convention, including Miss Cora Frances Stoddard, executive secretary of the Scientific Temperance Federation, and Miss Mary Campbell of India. For the big meetings three Salvation Army bands will furnish music and a musical choir will be led by Ernest Schildrick of this city.

The World League Against Alcoholism had its inception three years ago at the convention of the Anti-Saloon League of America in Wash- ington, when delegates from foreign progress and methods of the anti-alcohol and Canadian prohibition move- ment. It was decided then to widen the sphere of operations so as to em- brace the whole world, and repre- sentatives of 29 countries signed the constitution of the new organization. It is the purpose of the convention to discuss the future of the temperance cause.

More effective law enforcement, it is expected, will be one of the subjects dealt with by the convention. The national annual meetings of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, being held in Philadel- phia, will close in time to enable the delegates there to attend the world league convention in Toronto.

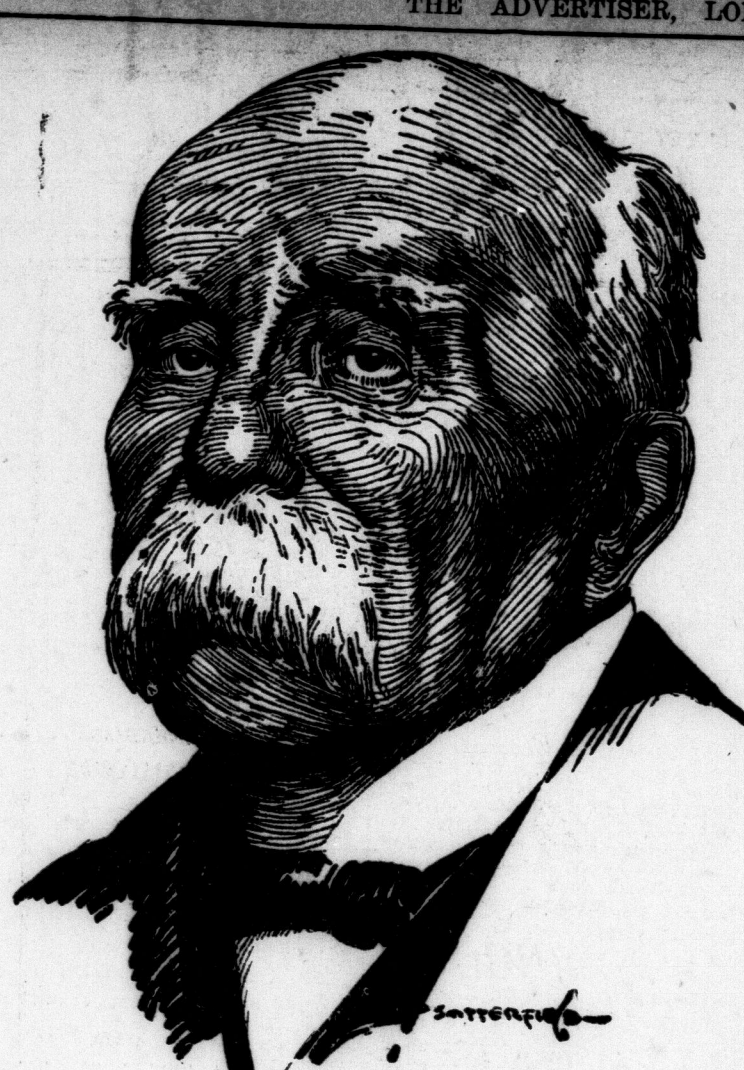

ELECT COUSIN OF SULTAN CALIPH

Crown Prince Abdul Effendi
Will Be Inducted Into
Office Today.

Constantinople, Nov. 19.—Crown Prince Abdul Medjid Effendi, cousin of Sultan Mohammed VI, was elected caliph by the great national assembly of Turkey on Saturday, and will be inducted into office tomorrow at the Topkapou palace.

Angora probably will be the seat of the caliphate, until the foreign oc- cupation of Constantinople ceases. Abdul Medjid Effendi was born in 1868.

Abdul Medjid received 148 votes out of a total of 200. The new caliph telegraphed his acceptance, reserving certain limited temporal powers. Abdul is the son of Sultan Abdul Aziz and is 54 years of age. He is described as learned in letters and literature, a patron of the arts and an accomplished painter and com- poser of music. He has always been closely identified with the Nationalist movement and is credited with a strong will. His friends state he will not be content to remain merely a religious head of Islam, but will in- sist upon exercising temporal powers.

"Only most Turks, he has only one wife, and lives modestly and quietly, not mingling in politics. He has a daughter and a son. Several thousand people will witness the investiture, which will be a most elaborate ceremony. The police are taking the utmost precautions to pro- tect the new caliph.

TELLER FOILS PLAN OF DARING BANDIT

Ducks Below Counter When
Robber Turns To Look
At Money.

Montreal, Nov. 19.—Quick action on the part of C. H. Morrow, formerly of Paris Sound, Ont., paying teller of the Sterling Bank, St. James street, frustrated the effort of a bandit on Saturday morning to obtain a thou- sand dollars at the point of a revol- ver. Morrow turned the tables so quickly that the bandit fled without getting a cent. He was almost caught by a police officer, but managed to evade the latter in the crowd on St. James street. The only damage was from two shots the bullet from which smashed a plate-glass window and lodged in the wall near the cell- ing of the premises.

Stepping up to the wicket of the paying-teller's cage about 11:15 in the morning, a man, afterwards de- scribed by Morrow as short, stout and dark, and wearing blue glasses, presented for payment an old and crumpled bank check. On it was written: "If you make one move or shout before I get to the door I will shoot to kill. Give me a hundred tens."

He pointed a revolver at Morrow, the weapon being wrapped in a hand- kerchief with only the end of the muzzle showing.

Morrow said: "I have not got that many tens here, but I have the amount in ones and twos."

"Give me those," said the bandit in a low voice.

Morrow began counting the bills, and when he saw that the bandit's attention was directed to the pile of bills he dropped suddenly behind his counter. He seized his revolver, and again facing the bandit, fired two shots.

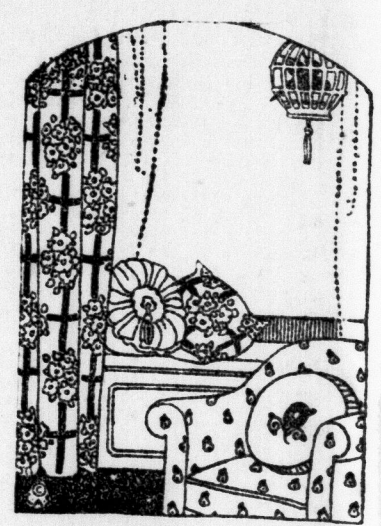
